

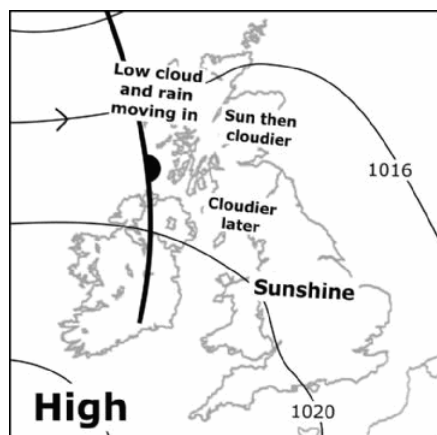
Peak District

General Summary for Tuesday, 8 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 8 July, 2025

A bright and sunny morning particularly in the east, then thickening cloud will lower across Scottish mountains from the west, with rain and drizzle developing, persistent in west; wind also increasing. England & Wales sees sunshine then high cloud, lowering onto tops by evening with a little rain arriving.

Headline for Peak District

Moderate breeze. Sunshine and high cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 8 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 15-20mph. Gradually shifting westerly and easing a little to 15mph. Toward evening increasing slightly again.
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling breezy early morning, becoming fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry all day Risk of a little drizzly rain reaching Lancashire Pennines by dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills cloud-free Fragments of cloud at first soon lifting off the summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain most of day
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive morning sunshine, high cloud gradually building through afternoon. Excellent visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	9C at dawn, rising to 13 to 15C, warmest on eastern slopes.
And in the valleys	9C at dawn, rising to 18 or 19C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 9 July	Thursday 10 July
How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 10 to 15mph, occasional 20mph in morning.	West to southwesterly 10-15mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Possible early drizzle Local pockets of drizzle in the morning, fading out.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early low cloud, clearing into afternoon Low cloud covering the hills fairly widely early in day, base around 400-500m or locally lower in west for a time. Lifting and breaking toward higher moors, then largely clearing by afternoon.	Hills soon clear Any early patchy mist or cloud around slopes soon dispersing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% early, rising to 90% afternoon.	Soon almost certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy morning, sun breaking through, increasingly sunnier afternoon-evening. Visibility becoming very good.	Mostly sunny. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	13C rising to 17C afternoon, humid.	14C rising to 19C.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 22C afternoon.	13C at dawn, rising to 25C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 9 July, 2025

A humid southwesterly wind during midweek produces extensive low cloud across west and northwest Scotland with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in eastern Scotland, improving in southern areas. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week; higher temperatures and more sunshine extending into Scotland with time. A fine and very warm weekend in prospect, low risk of thundery showers forming toward the west. Cooler with a greater risk of showers early next week.
