

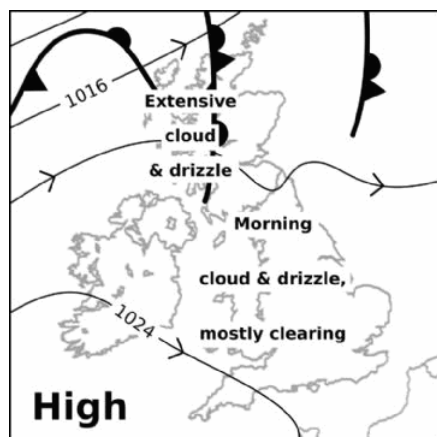
Peak District

General Summary for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 July, 2025

Extensive cloud and drizzle near the all western coasts; improving in the afternoon when only a few patches remain, most extensive on the Cuillin where it will also be windy. Cloud base higher well inland with occasional breaks; clearing Peak District and parts of Wales. Feeling cool in Scotland and mild in England and Wales.

Headline for Peak District

Morning cloud/drizzle clearing. Light winds.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 10 to 15mph, occasional 20mph in morning.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Possible early drizzle Local pockets of drizzle in the morning, fading out.
Cloud on the hills?	Early low cloud, clearing into afternoon Low cloud covering the hills fairly widely early in day, base around 400-500m or locally lower in west for a time. Lifting and breaking toward higher moors, then largely clearing by afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% early, rising to 90% afternoon.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy morning, sun breaking through, increasingly sunnier afternoon-evening. Visibility becoming very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	13C rising to 17C afternoon, humid. Feeling a touch cooler in the wind.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 23C afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 10 July	Friday 11 July
How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 10mph or less.	Light winds with variable direction.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible.	Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	Very likely dry Remote risk of isolated late-afternoon thundery showers. Dry otherwise.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills soon clear Any early patchy mist or cloud around slopes soon dispersing. Cloud may persist until midday in the western Peak District NP, on slopes overlooking Manchester and the Cheshire Plain.	Little or no cloud Very small chance of patchy cloud on higher ground should there be afternoon showers.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Soon almost certain	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny. Visibility very good.	Widespread sunshine; beware sunburn and dehydration. Excellent visibility on higher ground looking over low-level haze in the Midlands.
Temperature (at 600m)	14C rising to 19C.	21 to 24C in the afternoon.
And in the valleys	14C at dawn, rising to 25C in the afternoon.	12 to 15C at dawn, soon above 20C in the morning. Rising to 26 to 29C by mid-afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 10 July, 2025

A humid southwesterly wind midweek produces extensive low cloud across west and northwest Scotland with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in eastern Scotland, improving in southern areas. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week; higher temperatures and more sunshine extending into Scotland with time. A fine and very warm weekend in prospect, low risk of thundery showers forming toward the west. Cooler with a greater risk of showers early next week.
