

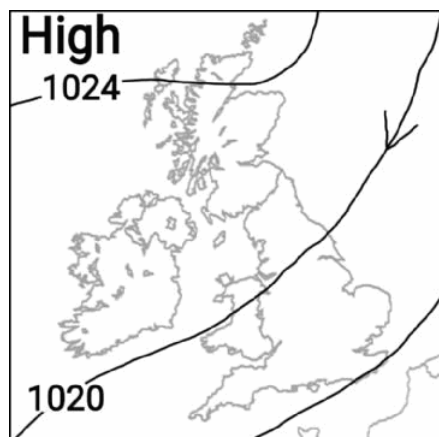
Peak District

General Summary for Wednesday, 20 August, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 20 August, 2025

High pressure to northwest, north-easterly winds; gustiest England and Wales. Cloud sheet fairly extensive from dawn, breaking up through day to sunshine, but patches persisting for the northern Highlands, into eastern Border Hills, and Pennines. Best sun in the west, aside from slow-moving cloudy zone of western Argyll.

Headline for Peak District

Blustery, cool. Cloud sheet morning, thinning out. Sunshine coming through.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 20 August, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly 20-30mph at dawn, easing to 15-25mph into afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Comfortable walking affected at times, mostly in the morning. Feeling rather chilly in the morning.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Very little or no precipitation A little damp feel with isolated fine spots of drizzle under the cloud in the morning, most likely in the east.
Cloud on the hills?	Patchy cloud tops, soon burning off. At dawn, patchy cloud drifting around terrain above 500m, some banks drifting further downslope in northeastern areas. Soon rising and burning off the summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40% at first, but soon rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sunshine mostly confined to west at first, but becoming more widespread. Very good visibility, some haze building through the day.
Temperature (at 600m)	8C rising to 12C. Feeling just above freezing at dawn in the wind.
And in the valleys	11C from dawn, rising to 16 to 18C, always warmest (or locally warmer) in western valleys.

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 21 August, 2025

High pressure dominates through this week, with initial north-easterly winds, easing out as the high builds overhead with lighter winds. With a cooler air-mass in place, widely chilly dawns, with a slight frost for some valleys and glens, especially in the Highlands. Banks of cloud coming and going on the hills, with periods of sunshine, generally best in the west. Wind and rain may edge off the Atlantic into next week, but much uncertainty in detail and timing of this change.
