

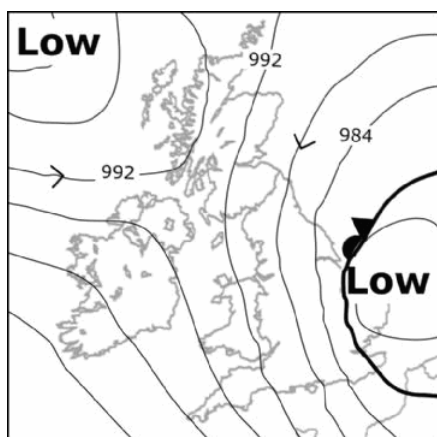
Peak District

General Summary for Thursday, 23 October, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 23 October, 2025

Areas of rain and strong winds within a large area of low pressure, will circulate across Britain. However, although varied, many mountain areas, particularly mainland Scotland and NW England, between low pressure centres will experience relatively light wind and hardly any rain.

Headline for Peak District

Blustery. Little or perhaps no rain.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 23 October, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwest to northerly, 25mph, perhaps 30mph at times.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly fairly small, although anticipate marked wind chill and buffeting on higher tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk of rain, most likely toward east Overnight rain may linger into the day, but will probably drift slowly away east, possibly leaving patches of light rain, most likely on more eastern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	May start extensive, but mostly or all clearing If rain occurs, cloud covering higher moors, possibly for several hours. More likely to lift and break to clear the hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud may thin to give hazy sunshine (through high level cloud). Visibility becoming excellent or perhaps superb.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C. Will feel as cold as -4C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Small variation, all day around 8 or 9C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Friday 24 October	Saturday 25 October
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 30mph, may ease in the afternoon and veer into the north or northwest.	North-westerly 25 to 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Be prepared for very blustery conditions and rather gusty with marked buffeting and wind chill.	Be prepared for very blustery and gusty conditions with significant wind chill and buffeting.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Scattered showers Scattered showers moving in on the westerly airflow through the day.	Mostly dry Perhaps one or two showers drifting in from north-west for a time. Otherwise dry.
Cloud on the hills?	May well often cap tops Cloud bases varying on and off the tops through the day. May be periods where cloud extent is fairly widespread over western tops especially.	Little if any
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A little sun at times through high cloud, mainly early in the day. Visibility good or very good, but falling in rain.	Frequent sunshine. Visibility excellent.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C	1C lifting to 3C, but feeling closer to -8C in the wind.
And in the valleys	4C at dawn, lifting to 10C in afternoon.	Around freezing valleys at dawn, lifting to highs of 8 or 9C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 24 October, 2025

A cold weekend; higher summits close to freezing point in England and Wales and below in Scotland. Substantially dry on many mountains but areas of frequent showers (hail and snow), mainly NW and W Highlands (where wind close to gale on Saturday) and north and west Wales. Some uncertainty for Sunday afternoon with threat of rain setting in on many western mountains - ahead of a less cold but often windy and wet few days.
