

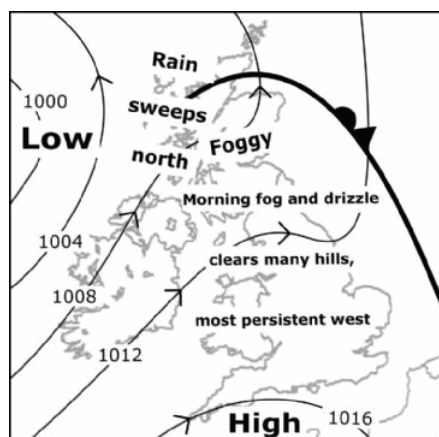
Peak District

General Summary for Saturday, 8 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 8 November, 2025

Morning rain in western Scotland with fog on most high terrain; lower and more extensive fog central and southern highlands. A misty, drizzly start on high terrain of England and Wales, though improving - cloud increasingly broken, particularly east of high tops. Feeling mild in moderate winds, a slight cooling later.

Headline for Peak District

Some fog and drizzle early, largely clearing

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 8 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Soon westerly 15 to 20mph. Strengthening into and overnight.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some drizzle, trending dry Occasional pockets of drizzle on high moors and local western slopes, this abating as the day goes for dry hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Misty on high terrain early, tending to clear Shrouding summits much of the day, some different fog layers possible, including some lower ragged patches in the morning. Cloud will increasingly break as the day goes to regularly expose high tops though always a chance of a cloud cap returning.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sunshine start the day, becoming increasingly sunny as cloud breaks. Mostly misty at first but improving to very good visibility, though a haze will linger.
Temperature (at 600m)	7 or 8C; generally on the warmer side at dawn but soon trending cooler.
And in the valleys	Mild 9C from dawn, rising only slightly up to 11C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 25-30mph. Rising as the day goes, reaching up to 35mph afternoon, risk of stronger gusts over Walking increasingly arduous with wind chill. Considerable buffeting will make stability challenging.	South-southwesterly 10-15mph. Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent rain afternoon Largely dry in the morning. Patchy rain arrives from the west afternoon, soon becoming quite frequent with heavy bursts.	Soon dry Showery rain from dawn soon clears, wet underfoot at first. A dry day follows.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Becoming extensive over high terrain From dawn, banks of cloud drifting over high moors but local breaks are likely. Through afternoon, banks become more frequent and bases will lower to middle slopes as rain arrives. 70%, lowering to 20%	Mostly high tops Fog fairly extensive on high terrain at and before dawn. Cloud will tend to lift as morning rain clears away, though banks may cling to high tops for extended periods. 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun through high cloud early, trending overcast through afternoon. Excellent visibility, becoming poor as rain arrives.	A mix of cloud and sun, at times more often cloudy. Excellent visibility.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	8 or 9C. Feeling below freezing in direct strongest wind. 7C from dawn, rising to 12C.	8C 9C at dawn, rising to 11 or 12C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 9 November, 2025

A cloudy and wet week ahead as several low pressure cores draw frontal systems across the British Isles. Rain at times extensive and heavy, streams in spate with a risk of flooding, primarily western mountains. Winds start fairly light but soon increase with gales becoming widespread by Tuesday, which may persist for several days. Temperatures remain mild until later in the week when cold air begins pushing into northern Scotland - timing and extent of the arrival of cold air remains uncertain but high terrain of Scotland and possibly northern England may start to see more snow around or after next weekend.
