

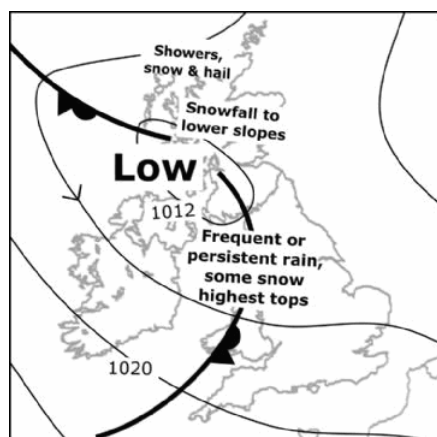
Peak District

General Summary for Tuesday, 18 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 18 November, 2025

Extensive snow Scottish Highlands, falling to lower elevations inland, later showers of snow & hail in north/west. Wind varied in Scotland, then strengthening northerlies. Rain and some snow over higher tops England and Wales plus westerlies up to gale force. Cloud covering most higher terrain.

Headline for Peak District

Windy. Rain setting in frequently from west, cloud lowers.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 18 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Generally westerly 25-30mph, but by middle of day onward typically stronger, 35mph with stronger gusts possible for a time. Into night, switching northerly after a brief lull, then further into night 30-40mph. Comfortable walking affected much of the day, risk of more arduous conditions developing from middle of day in exposure; considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain increasingly frequent, briefly snow high tops Scattered showers from dawn mostly west, snow flurries mixed on on highest tops early morning. Showers soon turn to more persistent rain in west, increasingly widespread by late morning onward. Frequent rain rest of day and into evening.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	High moors early, lowering in rain High moors likely shrouded in cloud much of the day. Most cloud above 600m well into the morning with breaks best in east, though tending to fill in with bases lowering as rain arrives. 40% at first, lowering to 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some bright skies and good visibility below cloud banks early morning in east, though soon widely overcast, poor visibility in rain.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	1C rising to 3C; then into night dropping to 0C. Feeling like -8C in strongest direct wind, then nearer -12C into night. 1 or 2C from dawn, slight frost some sheltered spots; rising to max 5C afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 25 to 40mph, likely strongest early in the day.	Northerly 25 to 40mph, speed may vary during day.
Effect of wind on you?	Risk of challenging conditions early morning, remaining blustery all day over tops, significant wind chill.	Strenuous walking, at times challenging conditions on high terrain with significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow flurries fading Areas of snow showers over the hills from overnight may linger beyond dawn, then clearing away southwards to be substantially dry, chance a rare flurry.	Possible local snow flurries Chance of an occasional snow flurry or brief shower coming in from the northeast.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting from hills Patchy cloud over some higher moors from dawn into morning, but lifting and clearing above the hills.	Little if any Rare fragments around some higher moors, mostly just if showers occur, but the hills largely clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some early cloud, but more sunshine with time, eastern areas may stay cloudier. Visibility soon generally excellent.	Patchwork of cloud and bright sun. Visibility mostly excellent.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	-1C. Wind chill feeling like -10C to nearer -15C in stronger speeds. Near freezing from dawn and soon again from dusk. Reaching max 5C early afternoon.	-1 or -2C. Wind chill feeling like -10C to nearer -15C in stronger speeds. Near freezing from dawn and soon again from dusk. Briefly up to max 4 or 5C early afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 19 November, 2025

Snow lying most widely in Scottish Highlands, to lower slopes inland, some high tops elsewhere into midweek. Strong to gale force northerlies Wednesday-Thursday, bringing snow and hail showers focused on northern Scotland and onto north-facing coastal districts elsewhere. Sunnier from central Scotland southward through northern England. By Friday into next weekend, winds shift back westerly and freezing levels rise to upper slopes - some rain likely, snow on high tops at times.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Monday, 17 November, 2025
