




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 25 November, 2025

Higher areas, mainly Scottish Highlands frozen, and frost some valleys at first.

Otherwise, benign as from the west the northerly wind drops and snow and hail showers become isolated.

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 25mph at first. Gradually easing to 15mph through the day.	
Effect of wind on you?	Becoming small - though notable wind chill in the morning.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation	
Cloud on the hills?	Very little if any	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright sunshine. Excellent visibility.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 25mph, strengthening by early afternoon to 35 to 40mph. Soon extensively arduous or difficult walking where exposed with sudden gusts and considerable wind chill.	South to southwesterly, strengthening through morning and with height to 45mph where exposed on higher tops. Deteriorating with significant wind chill and walking widely difficult.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off, mainly afternoon Intermittent rain and drizzle gradually spreading east, most likely later middle of day. Total rain small.	Rain and drizzle now and again Pulses of rain and drizzle, although intermittently or often dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Higher hills gradually filling in with fog Higher slopes initially cloud free. Will deteriorate in rain as across western hills cloud lowers to around 400m, and 500m eastern areas.	Mountains extensively foggy. Almost persistent cloud from 350 to occasionally 550m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Dropping to 20%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A few glimpses of weak sunshine lower slopes. Becoming misty in rain.	A few glimpses of weak sun lower slopes. Visibility sometimes poor, generally hazy.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	3C rising to 5C through daylight. Will feel as cold as minus 6C directly in the wind. Widespread frost at first, as low as minus 3C; but rising through daylight to around 5 or 6C.	9C. Will feel as cold as minus 3C directly in the wind. Around 12C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 26 November, 2025

A long series of Atlantic lows passing north of or across Britain will bring high rainfall to western mountains together with frequent upland gales (sometimes storm force) and low cloud. Temperatures on higher tops sometimes below freezing point, particularly at the weekend in Scotland, but elsewhere fresh snow transient.
