




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

# General Summary for Monday, 1 December, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 December, 2025

Morning rain and snow in Scottish Highlands breaks for several hours then returns from the south later. Rain more persistent over the Southern Uplands with heavy bursts south and a risk of strong winds. Gales and rain widely across England and Wales, increasing risk of flooding in Lakeland and west Wales.

Gusty gales and near-persistent rain, at times heavy

# **Detailed Forecast for Monday, 1 December, 2025**

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 40 to 50mph most likely all day, powerful gusts around edges and locally downslope to the north and east.		
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions throughout the day on higher terrain; downslope gusts will challenge stability on lower terrain as well. Considerable wind chill.		
How wet?	Persistent at times heavy rain		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain likely much of the day, intensity may vary, sometimes easing to be drizzly, but some sustained heavier falls likely, particularly areas toward north and west.		
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive higher moors		
	May vary somewhat, but often shrouding the higher moors above 500-600m, at times lowering more extensively in rain, particularly west and southwest areas.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%

Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling breezy in exposure with noticeable wind chill on high tops.	Comfort of walking affected, particularly in exposure where it will feel chilly.
How wet?	Largely dry	Substantially dry
(Precipitation and its impact)	Chance of an isolated brief shower mainly western areas. Wet underfoot after previous rain, fast-flowing streams.	Chance of a few odd showers, focused on western slopes and Lancashire Pennines.
Cloud on the hills?	Some areas of cloud on hills	Mostly high terrain, at times clear moors
	Banks of cloud covering higher slopes for periods, particularly west and southern areas, possibly to mid-lower slopes for a time mainly morning. Breaks likely to form above many hills. ### **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 2 December, 2025

A risk of local flooding remains on Tuesday in Wales and the Lake district following Monday's heavy rain. Areas of low pressure circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern in the week ahead, bringing generally unsettled weather. Temperatures near average - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week. Often showery and cloudy in the west with broader bands of rain regularly passing east. Wind speed likely to vary though often quite strong with risk of gales coming and going. First indications suggest unsettled weather will remain dominant into the weekend.
