


Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 9 March, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 March, 2026

Humid air will bring extensive low cloud and bursts of showery rain to the mountains. However, in places breaks in the low cloud will allow sunshine through, whilst the cloud base will be very varied - making detail difficult. Windy northern and western Scottish Highlands.

Headline for Peak District

Mostly cloudy; a few bursts of showery rain.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 9 March, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain; very little in total Bursts, probably brief, of showery rain now and again. Some places may well stay dry, and total rainfall everywhere small.
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive - although cloud base rising, perhaps breaking. Very likely blanket of fog from lower slopes up from dawn. Cloud base will rise from late morning, and in afternoon, most cloud will be above 450 to possibly 550m and may possibly clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% rising to 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Widely dull and misty or murky morning. The cloud slowly breaking in places. However, may well remain very hazy.
Temperature (at 600m)	6C
And in the valleys	Will reach 11 or 12C in afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 10 March	Wednesday 11 March
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South to southwesterly; 25 to perhaps 30mph. Likely to impede ease of walking on higher areas.	Westerly up to 40mph post dawn; through day dropping slowly, typically 30mph middle of day. Expect considerable wind chill and walking to be arduous, particularly morning.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Risk of an isolated brief burst of rain.	Showers A few rain and hail showers (these mainly northernmost Peak District and north toward Pendle).
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	May well clear during morning Cloud may well shroud higher slopes for a few hours after dawn, but very likely all clearing before midday. 80% by midday	Frequently clearing In precipitation, cloud temporarily forming below 400 to 500m. Otherwise, by midday nearly all cloud above the summits. 80% by midday
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sun - cloud fairly extensive over all. Very good or excellent visibility by midday as haze clears.	Patchwork of sunshine, most sun Peak District east and south of Manchester. Visibility mostly very good or excellent.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	5C Will reach 11 or 12C.	3C. Will feel like minus 6C directly in the wind. 9 to 11C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 10 March, 2026

Later this week - with the current mostly cloudy and hazy or murky conditions clearing on Tuesday night . Bouts of upland severe or storm force winds will reach the Scottish Highlands and gales periodically affecting other mountain areas . Freeze thaw cycles will occur on higher areas south from S Scotland whilst the Scottish Highlands experience infrequent thaw, with fresh snow sometimes reaching lower slopes, whilst extensive higher up.
