

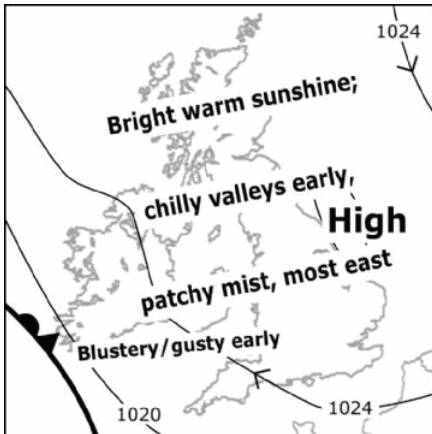
Peak District

General Summary for Friday, 24 April, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 24 April, 2026

Some valley fog/mist at dawn, notably east, local frosts as well. Soon after sunrise, cloud dissipates for widespread strong sunshine and warming temperatures, many valleys approaching 20C, including Scottish Highlands; high UV levels, beware sunburn risk. Negligible wind, though a blustery start in south Wales.

Headline for Peak District

Early low fog east and chilly valleys, soon warm sunshine

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 24 April, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable 10mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Some early low fog, otherwise clear Fog patches in the valleys from dawn, mostly east, briefly starts lifting upslope after sunrise, but soon dissipates for cloud-free hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Very good visibility, slight low-level haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	7C rising to 14C. (Hills warmer than valleys at first).
And in the valleys	Close to freezing in sheltered valleys at dawn with slight frost, though locally up to 2C. Rising to 20C afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable direction mostly 10mph or less.	Generally south-southwesterly, but variable, 10mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible.	Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	None expected	Moors clearing through morning Patchy cloud at various height in the morning, including into valleys, most extensive on east slopes. Cloud lifts and breaks from sunrise through morning, the moors soon clear of cloud.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%	Soon rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine, some thin high cloud. Visibility good, slight low-level haze.	Fairly sunny, some high cloud, which will occasionally thicken. Very good visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	10 to 14C.	5 or 6C, rising to 12C.
And in the valleys	Patchy frost at dawn valleys and sheltered higher areas. Rising toward 20C afternoon.	4C at dawn, rising to 16 or 17C.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 25 April, 2026**

A generally dry spell of weather continues into the weekend and next week, with mostly light winds and pleasantly warm temperatures, reaching 10C+ on many tops. Valleys and some sheltered higher areas will see some frosty and misty dawns but by the afternoons many valleys will warm up toward 20C. Briefly cooler air drifts back into northeastern areas later on Saturday, with a risk of some patchy nuisance rain here and there Sunday into Monday. Strong April sunshine widely across the mountains, beware risk of sunburn. Some uncertainty about the location of the centre of high pressure, with a risk of strong, gusty winds across England and Wales next week.
