

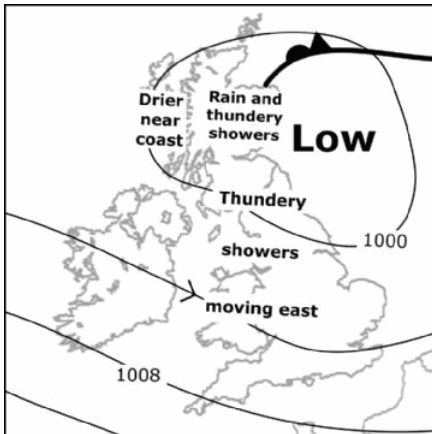
Peak District

General Summary for Tuesday, 2 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 2 June, 2026

Heavy showery bursts of rain with thunder and lightning, moving eastwards over England, Wales and south-central Scotland. A zone of more persistent rain affects the Cairngorms, heavy bursts mixed in. Drier toward west coast of Scotland, improving in western England & Wales in afternoon as the breeze freshens.

Headline for Peak District

Breeze increases, showery bursts move east, risk thunder.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 2 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwest turning westerly 20mph, freshening during afternoon to 25mph, later gusts 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling breezy on higher moors, starting to affect ease of walking in places later, feeling cool in exposure.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy thundery showers middle of day Showery rain on and off, most frequent for a few hours through middle of day, some heavy bursts, risk of thunder. Many showers clear east through afternoon, leaving well scattered lighter showers by evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above tops Some patchy cloud banks mainly over western higher moors in the morning, but lifting to leave most cloud above the hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, breaking through more often from west afternoon-evening. Visibility very good, reduced in showers.
Temperature (at 600m)	10C up to 13C afternoon. Feeling like 3 to 5C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to max 18C afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 3 June	Thursday 4 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South-southwesterly 30 to 40mph, at times near 50mph at least in gusts on high tops, top speeds midday into Widely strenuous walking in exposure, buffeting gusts on higher tops, balance challenging. Considerable wind chill.	Southwest then westerly 20 to 25mph, strengthening toward 30-35mph afternoon. Increasingly blustery, affecting comfortable walking, becoming more strenuous, buffeting gusts later. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain, drizzle, then showery bursts Rain extends in from the west during the morning, persistent rain middle of day, heaviest in west, then fading to drizzle, but some further heavy showery bursts moving eastward afternoon-evening, chance isolated thunder.	Bursts of rain on and off, risk lightning Occasional showers mostly west in morning, but showery rain developing increasingly widely, heavy bursts extending eastward, risk of thunder. May fade in northwest later.
Cloud on the hills?	Hill fog especially in rain Covering higher moors for periods, may linger above 500-600m in west, sometimes lower in rain. Rising somewhat in afternoon if dry, may clear tops. Ragged patches lower again in showers.	Varied, sometimes on tops Patchy varied cloud banks mostly western hills in the morning, lifting onto higher slopes or breaking above, but lowering during and after rain with brief ragged patches to lower slopes.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mostly east, largely cloudy. Visibility good below cloud, but reduced in rain.	Rare brief sun, mostly in east in morning. Visibility at times very good, but reduced in rain, occasionally poor.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	8C rising to 11C afternoon. Wind chill feeling like 0 to -3C. 10C at dawn, rising to max 16C afternoon.	8 to 10C, then tending to drop into night. Feeling close to freezing in the wind. 10C at dawn, rising to 14 or 15C afternoon, but dropping a few degrees again in rain.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 3 June, 2026**

An unsettled spell this week and next, as low pressure over the north Atlantic and west-southwesterly winds dominate. Periods of rain mixed with showery days widely - the most constant rain over western mountains with low cloud often shrouding the hills. Wind speed will vary, but up to gale-force for periods over the hills this week, then typically less windy next week. Temperatures near average, cooler at times. Briefly higher pressure by Saturday with fewer showers, but a further area of rain likely returns from the west during Sunday. Mid June onward shows signs of drier and warmer weather as higher pressure then expands northward with time.
