

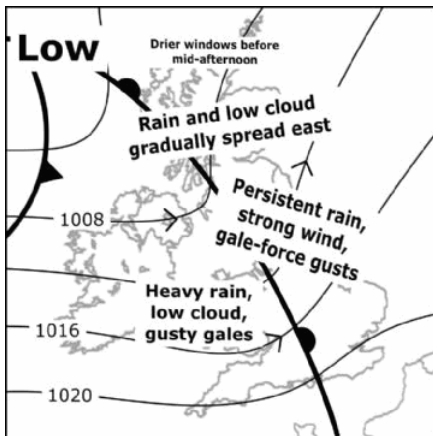
Peak District

General Summary for Thursday, 11 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 11 June, 2026

Persistent rain onto western hills from dawn, soon spreading widely. Murky with heavy falls, extended heavy falls west Wales. Very windy England and Wales, gale-force gusts, strongest Wales. Rain and strong wind slower to reach north and east Scotland though blanket low cloud fills in.

Persistent rain, heavy falls; very windy, gale-force gusts

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 11 June, 2026

<p>How windy? (On the summits)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>Southwesterly 15-20mph dawn, shifting southerly and strengthening, to 30-35mph by midday hours, variable for several hours but with stronger gusts reaching 45mph. Turning westerly, afternoon speeds settling near 35-40mph with strong gusts.</p> <p>Conditions deteriorate through morning to widely arduous conditions from midday onward, frequent buffeting requiring constant effort to maintain stability. Considerable wind chill.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Persistent rain, likely heaviest midday</p> <p>Rain arriving from dawn in west, the rain increasingly heavy with sustained heavier falls for several midday hours. An easing trend through afternoon though likely remaining widely wet.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free summits?</p>	<p>Extensive over hills</p> <p>Soon shrouding most hills above 500-600m, some banks to lower slopes western areas, especially northern Peaks and into mid-Pennines.</p> <p>Soon lowering to 10%</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Overcast and dull. Poor visibility much of day in rain.</p>
<p>Temperature (at 600m)</p> <p>And in the valleys</p>	<p>7C, gradually rising through the day to 12C evening, staying elevated into the night. Feeling at or below freezing in strongest wind.</p> <p>9C at dawn rising to 13C afternoon, or slightly milder toward evening.</p>

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Friday 12 June	Saturday 13 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 35mph, occasionally gusting 40mph.	West shifting northwesterly 25-30mph, occasional stronger swathes over high tops to 35mph or stronger.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over the hills, more strenuous in places where exposed. Feeling cool despite fairly mild air.	Walking impeded in exposure and at times strenuous with a chilly feel.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, some drizzle Generally damp over the moors from dawn with drizzle and patchy rain on and off from the west. Some chance easing later in the day.	Substantially dry Some risk of rare patchy rain drifting across the moors from the northwest, but always light in nature.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive on high terrain Often foggy over higher moors above 500-600m, sometimes shrouding hill slopes to lower elevations in west. Sometimes the cloud rising higher in east, and a rising chance of some brief breaks later.	Lifting off the summits Patchy cloud on high terrain early in the day, possibly some ragged lower patches too, mostly western slopes. Cloud lifts for clear hills afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	Rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, glimpses of sun mostly eastern areas. Visibility good where dry and below cloud, mistier over tops and in rain locally.	Bursts of sunshine, weakened by high cloud. Very good visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	11 to 13C. Feeling like 0 to 3C where exposed to wind.	7C rising to 11C. Feeling just above freezing in strongest wind.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 17C afternoon.	9C at dawn, rising to 16C, or possibly warmer southernmost valleys.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 12 June, 2026**

Damp westerly breezes on Friday will cloak most mountains in cloud and some drizzle, better conditions eastwards. Cool and strong westerlies persist in Scotland on Saturday, then warmer with lighter winds by Sunday. Some patchy rain remaining in west and northwest Scotland over the weekend. Pressure tends to rise from the south this weekend, bringing warmer air and drier conditions to England & Wales, although west coast mountains may hold onto cloud. Into next week, a mixed southwesterly pattern remains, windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler westerly air likely returns at times mid-late week. Higher pressure then shows more signs of expanding over the country by late next week bringing improving conditions.
