

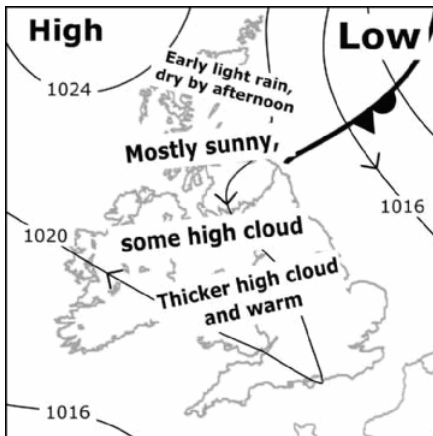
Peak District

General Summary for Sunday, 14 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 14 June, 2026

Some early drizzle and patchy light rain in northern Scotland fades by afternoon. Elsewhere dry all day and often sunny though some high cloud weakening sun in places; sun may be more patchy east Scotland and later northern England. Warm southern Pennines and Wales. Light wind, though starting blustery in east Scotland.

Headline for Peak District

Breezy early, soon easing; sun through high cloud, warm

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 14 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 20-25mph early, to 30mph just at dawn. Soon easing, to 15mph midday and largely 10mph or less by late in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, though a blustery, gusty start on the high tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Any rain unlikely Remote chance of odd spots of light rain in the morning, but the moors likely entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Early cloud clears the hills May be fairly extensive over the high edges at and before dawn with variable banks to lower slopes in the west, particularly Lancashire Pennines. Soon after sunrise, cloud lifts above the summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny, though weakened by high cloud, occasionally thicker patches of cloud. Very good visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	7C rising to 12 or 13C.
And in the valleys	8C at dawn rising to 16C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Monday 15 June	Tuesday 16 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South-southeasterly 15-20mph; lower speeds likely in the morning, and strongest breezes to 25mph late in the day. Fairly small, though a notable breeze over the summits late in the day.	Southwesterly 15mph early, gradually rising, finishing 30-35mph. Fairly small, but increasingly blustery, strenuous walking over tops into nighttime.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry A risk of some light patchy rain with time in the afternoon, though many moors may see no rain at all until late in the day or overnight.	Substantially dry until later A few patches of light rain drift over the moors from time to time, but probably dry well into the day, then a risk of more frequent rain, may set in for several hours towards evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Soon clear Some patchy cloud at various heights in the morning, mostly in the east, this soon breaking up and lifting off the tops for cloud-free moors.	Lifting to or above summits for several hours Extensive to at least middle slopes for a few early hours, a lifting tendency, bases grazing the summits and probably several hours of often above the summits. Later, cloud returns extensively to high terrain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Rising to 60% for several hours
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny though some high cloud around, likely thickening later in the day. Very good visibility.	Mostly cloudy, a few brighter moments afternoon. Very good visibility as cloud breaks.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	8C rising to 13C. 6C at dawn, rising to 16 or 17C.	11C rising up to 14C; may be slightly cooler afternoon, some variability. 10 or 11C at dawn, rising to 18C.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 15 June, 2026**

Through Monday, cloud will return from the southwest and bring some patchy rain with it. From Tuesday onward, a variable southwesterly will dominate through at least mid-week. Windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west; Tuesday into Wednesday is likely a wetter and unsettled period, with the unsettled weather lingering well into Wednesday in Scotland. Warmest in England and Wales, but may stay cooler in Scotland as low pressure to the northwest recycles air from the north Atlantic back onto the Munros. Pressure generally trending higher later in the week, centred southeast of England, but low pressure to the west of Ireland will prevent any extended settled periods with more windy, wet weather at times next weekend; temperatures likely become more widely warm.
