

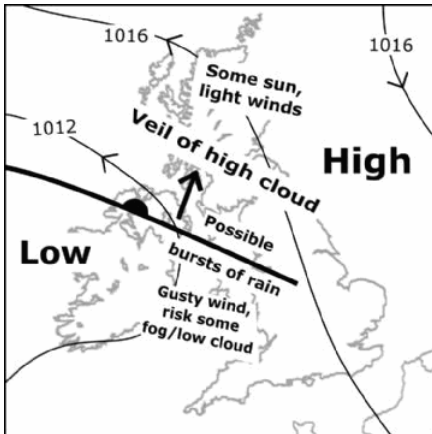
Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 15 June, 2026



**British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 15 June, 2026**

A largely dry day for the Highlands, light winds inland and north, some sun, but a layer of cloud increasingly covers the sky from the south, later some rain moving into coastal areas. A little rain for northern England and Wales, locally risk of a heavier burst of rain forming. Gusty southerly winds particularly Wales.

Headline for Peak District

Breeze increasing. Largely dry, an odd shower. Hills mostly clear.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 15 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 10mph early morning, increasing to 15-20mph, reaching gusty 25mph late in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, though a notable breeze over the summits late in the day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry, chance a burst of rain A risk of some light patchy rain with time in the afternoon, very locally an odd showery burst of rain may form, but many places may well remain largely dry all day.
Cloud on the hills?	Soon clear Some patchy cloud at various heights in the morning, mostly in the east, this soon breaking up and lifting off the tops for cloud-free moors.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Weak sun and high cloud, thickening to cover the sky. Very good visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	8C rising to 13C.
And in the valleys	6C at dawn, rising to 16 or 17C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 16 June	Wednesday 17 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 15mph early, gradually rising, reaching 25-30mph afternoon-evening. Fairly small, but increasingly blustery, strenuous walking over tops into nighttime.	Southwesterly 25mph, some stronger gusts around higher tops and some edges. Blustery over the hills, making walking uncomfortable in places where exposed on higher terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry until later A few patches of light rain drift over the moors from time to time, but often dry well into afternoon then a risk of more frequent rain later in day, may set in for several hours by evening.	Intermittent rain Patchy rain and drizzle, some showery moments occasionally; the most frequent rain generally western areas. Tending to clear later in day to odd light showers.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to or above summits for several hours Extensive to at least middle slopes for a few early hours, a lifting tendency, bases grazing the summits and probably several hours of often above the summits. Later, cloud returns extensively to high terrain.	Most extensive in rain, lowest west Covering higher moors during rain, to 400m or locally lower at times in westernmost areas in the morning. Tending to rise during afternoon, may lift from many hills, but risk lingering over west of Kinder and Bleaklow to 500m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 60% for several hours	50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, a few brighter moments afternoon. Very good visibility as cloud breaks.	Largely cloudy, some sun may break through later afternoon. Visibility good where dry, later very good, but hazier for periods in rain.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	11C rising up to 14C; slightly cooler toward evening. Later feeling near 5C in exposure to wind. 10 or 11C at dawn, rising to 18C.	12C rising to 15C afternoon. Feeling like 5C directly in wind. 13C at dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 16 June, 2026**

A variable southwesterly will dominate through mid to late this week - windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Pressure generally trending higher from the south by the weekend, though into Saturday at least a damp westerly likely prevails into western Scotland. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler in Scotland as low pressure to the northwest recycles air from the north Atlantic back onto the Munros. A window of drier and warmer weather is favoured into early the following week (22nd June), though a mixed Atlantic pattern may linger near to northwest Scotland in the longer range.
