

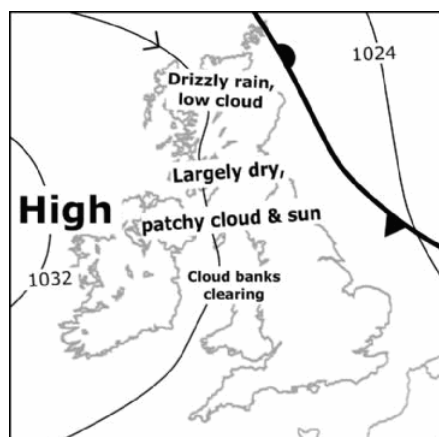
Peak District

General Summary for Wednesday, 22 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 22 July, 2026

Dull and damp for northern Scotland much of the day, low cloud blanketing the hills, fresh northwesterly winds, feeling cool. Drier and better cloud breaks southward across the Highlands. Some cloud on hills in northern England and Wales tending to lift and break, some warm sunshine.

Headline for Peak District

Largely dry, cloud mostly above hills. Fairly light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 22 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	North to northwesterly 10 to 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rare if any light showers Chance of an odd drizzly shower western hills early in day, and low risk an isolated light shower toward evening in north.
Cloud on the hills?	Early patches soon clear Some cloud banks early morning may graze higher western slopes around 500-600m, but soon lifting above the hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60% rising above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, possibly cloudier for a few hours. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	12C rising to 17C.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 23C afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 23 July	Friday 24 July
How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 10 to 15mph.	West or northwesterly 20 to 25mph, speeds tending to rise slightly later in day.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Breezy over the hills, starting to affect ease of walking in some exposed spots. Feeling quite cool.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Generally dry Small chance a brief light shower mainly later in the day.	Rain unlikely Chance of a brief patch of drizzle mainly western hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Largely clear Any early brief patches of cloud forming on western upslopes soon rising above the hills.	Little if any Rare patchy cloud drifting onto upper western slopes in the morning, then clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, clouding over for periods. Visibility very good.	Cloud and intermittent sun, best in east. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	12C rising to 17C afternoon.	10C rising to 14C. Feeling like 4 to 7C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn rising to 23C afternoon.	11C at dawn, rising to 20C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 23 July, 2026

Westerly winds strengthen widely later this week, reaching gale-force over Scottish tops on Friday; low cloud across western Scotland, drizzle and steadier light rain, turning heavier later Friday. A swathe of persistent rain and strong winds moving southwards across Britain into Saturday, leaving a legacy of showers for Scotland, winds tending to lessen. Further areas of showers into Sunday. A changeable westerly pattern into next week and likely into early August, bringing spells of rain and showers; varying wind speeds, strengthening at times to gales on high tops. Often cooler for Scotland, a mix of cooler and warmer days for England & Wales.
