

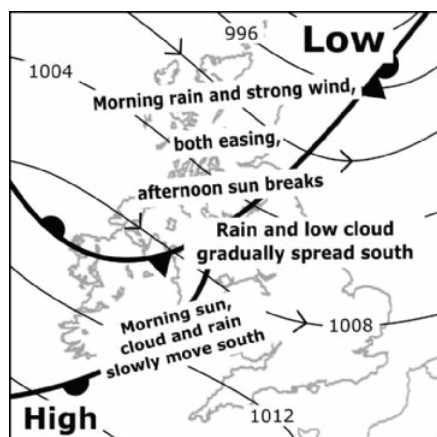
Peak District

General Summary for Saturday, 25 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 July, 2026

Windy early, gale-force gusts in Scotland with significant wind chill. Morning rain in Scotland slips south into north England by midday, patchy sun breaks out in Scotland. Morning sun in Wales, rain reaching here through afternoon from north. Most rain on western hill groups where cloud will become extensive.

Headline for Peak District

Blustery; bright early, cloud and rain/drizzle sets in

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 25 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 30 to 40mph, some fluctuation of speed during day, gusty for periods. Trending to lighter speeds late in the day, 20-30mph around sunset.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking and feeling cool over exposed higher moors for most of the day, some buffeting gusts, the strongest of which will impact stability.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some rain and drizzle develops Largely dry morning. Patchy rain and drizzle developing from the northwest as midday approaches, periods of persistent but light rain develop on western hills afternoon-evening, a local heavier fall possible; staying patchy further south and east, some places more often dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Clear early, lowering in rain, lowest west Varied banks of cloud toward northwest at dawn, tops further south and east start clear, and soon all clear for several morning hours. Cloud lowers from the north as rain arrives, blanketing hills to 400-500m west.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90% dropping to 20% in rain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A bright start, but cloud soon thickens from the north, likely becoming dull and misty with poor visibility where in rain.
Temperature (at 600m)	11 or 12C rising up to 16C southernmost moors; Lancashire Pennines only rising towards 14C. Feeling like 2 to 5C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 17 or 18C afternoon, coolest in northwest, and starting to cool in the mid afternoon.

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 26 July, 2026

West-northwesterly winds prevail this weekend and early next week, transitioning to southwesterly through mid-to-late week, bringing spells of rain, drizzle and some showery falls; low cloud persistent across hills, particularly in the west. Lower wind speeds for Scotland on Sunday, staying quite breezy England and Wales. Rather cool this weekend and Monday, single-figures Celsius on high terrain. More prolonged heavier rain possible for western Scotland Monday-Tuesday. More humid and warm into mid and late week, especially England & Wales which could become hot later in the week. More uncertainty later in the week as a slow-moving area of low pressure is nearby, but risk areas of heavy rain and showers into next weekend as well.
