

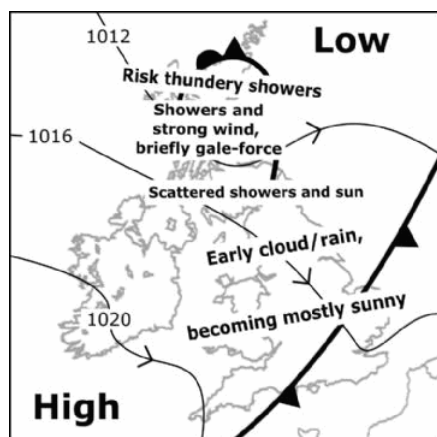
Peak District

General Summary for Thursday, 30 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 July, 2026

Cool, windy, and showery in Scotland. Gales and heavy showers pass west-to-east across the highlands, showers most frequent with lightning risk north. Starting breezy with rain over the Pennines and Wales, this clearing east for sun, a few odd showers northwest England. Mild-to-warm England and Wales.

Headline for Peak District

Dawn rain and hill cloud clears for afternoon sun

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 30 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15 to 25mph, some variability through the day, and sometimes quite gusty.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but some periods of more blustery conditions over the high tops with a chilly feeling.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers clearing Rain and drizzle on and off for a few hours before clearing mid to late morning.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly lifting above tops A layer of cloud shrouds the moors from 500m up at and before dawn, lower bases on western hills. Bases begin lifting after dawn, soon to the high tops, and beginning to break for clear summits by late-morning.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to become almost certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy morning, sun breaking through from the west through morning, for a mostly sunny afternoon. Visibility becoming very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	11 or 12C rising to 14C afternoon, then cooling back later afternoon into evening. Feeling like 4 to 7C in exposure to wind.
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 31 July, 2026

Cool and showery westerlies into the weekend, windy over high terrain; western hills often capped in cloud. Southern Pennines and Wales likely see only scattered showers and remain warm. Cloud encroaches from the southwest on Sunday, winds turn southerly and warmer air wafts back across England and Wales. A complex area of low pressure is then expected to circulate slowly over Britain early next week, bringing areas of rain and heavy showers, some thundery downpours possible. Winds varying, trending northerly and strengthening, to gales over high summits on Tuesday. A window of improvement from midweek, which may persist into the weekend, but a showery northwesterly persists in Scotland. Beware ongoing fire management restricting access to some mountains.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service. 2026.
