

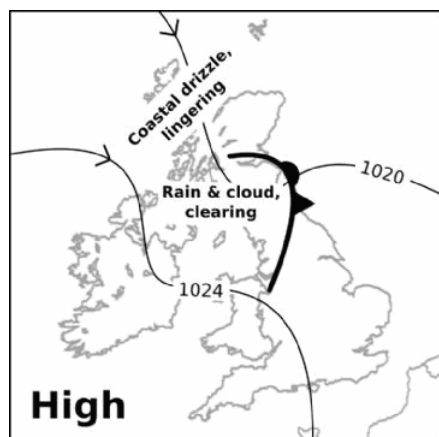

General Summary for Friday, 15 July, 2022



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 15 July, 2022

Overnight rain across the southern Highlands and northern England will clear eastwards, eventually giving a fine day in many places. Coastal mountains likely to remain in some cloud all day with drizzle on and off. Moderate breeze from the northwest will feel cool.

Headline for Snowdonia National Park

Coastal cloud with risk of drizzle at times.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 15 July, 2022

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly veering northwesterly 15 to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk of a little drizzly rain near coast Coastal hills, particularly Snowdon range, may have isolated drizzly rain. Highest risk in morning but could occur through day. Well inland: Rain not expected.
Cloud on the hills?	Coastal hills extensively cloudy Coastal summits, particularly Snowdon range, may well be in cloud for much of the day. Berwyn Hills and hills east of Cadair Idris likely to be cloud free.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% Snowdon range; 60% elsewhere
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Away from coast, good visibility and occasional sunshine. May cloud over for periods.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10C, not much change through the day. Feeling around 3C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above summits

Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 16 July	Sunday 17 July
How windy? (On the summits)	Light winds, 5 to 10mph	Some uncertainty. Southwesterly 15 to 30mph, risk of 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small	Wind may affect ease of walking and balance if higher wind speeds materialise.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	Very likely dry
Cloud on the hills?	Cloud not expected	Hills generally clear
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain	Practically certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine, perhaps through thin high cloud. Beware of sunburn. Hazy.	Hazy. Pockets of sunshine soon merging as mid-level cloud moves eastwards.
How Cold? (at 900m)	13C. Little change through day and only a little change with height in the morning.	15 rising to 20C, only a little change with height at first.
Freezing Level	Above summits	Above summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 16 July, 2022

Becoming increasingly hot by the start of next week in all mountain areas. Potential for widespread exceptionally high temperatures even into the Scottish Highlands. Beware of dehydration and sunburn. Risk of thunderstorms developing from the south by Tuesday into Wednesday. Still some uncertainty about the forecast detail at this stage, although fresher conditions are expected to return. Later next week northwesterly winds are likely to prevail across northern Britain as high pressure builds in the Atlantic. This is likely to bring rain or showers at times, mainly western Scotland. Further south more often dry.
