



General Summary for Thursday, 24 August, 2023



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 August, 2023

A shallow low will continue toward NW Scotland, resulting in showery rain extending east across the Highlands. Elsewhere, a drop in humidity during the morning (perhaps into afternoon Wales) will herald an improvement: much higher cloud base and only a few showers.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Fairly light wind. Becoming dry. Cloud base progressively rising.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 24 August, 2023

How windy? (On the summits)	West or northwesterly 15mph, although perhaps 20 or at times 25mph higher tops Snowdon range.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Pockets of drizzle rain from dawn, mainly western mountains. The rain will gradually fizzle out to be extensively dry by midday. Low risk passing shower east Wales afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive morning; cloud base rising: some summits may clear Cloud extensively across the hills from dawn, forming on lower slopes near the west coast. Cloud base will tend to rise morning and probably more quickly afternoon. By mid afternoon, little cloud below 750m and perhaps 900m by evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%, rising to 70% by mid afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sunshine morning; patchwork of sun developing afternoon. Haze slowly thinning, perhaps later mostly excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly; 15 to 20mph, although post dawn nearer 10mph.	West or northwesterly 20 to 25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Mostly fairly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers Drizzly showers mainly west Wales morning. Then heavier showers, mainly away from western mountains.	Showery Confidence low: After dawn widely dry, but here and there remnants of earlier rain and drizzle. This may persist on and off Snowdon range most of day Elsewhere, from late morning showers developing.
Cloud on the hills?	Summits extensively foggy, but cloud base gradually rising Generally fog covering higher areas most or all morning; in places forming on lower slopes. However, a progressive rise in cloud base, by mid afternoon, breaks above 750 to perhaps 900m (highest E Wales).	Extensive on higher areas Low confidence: Generally in rain areas of cloud below 450m, but by mid morning away from immediate coastal slopes, most cloud above 600m. In afternoon, most summits may clear at least temporarily - but in rain likely to reform. Hills in Snowdon range least likely
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine. Visibility mostly very good or excellent by afternoon.	Occasional sunshine, mainly east Wales. Slight haze, especially Snowdon range.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C.	8C
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 25 August, 2023**

Low rainfall and mostly light wind through this weekend and on Monday, although the remnants of fronts will bring a little rain and areas of low cloud.

Beyond further areas of low pressure will move in off the Atlantic, bringing further rain and low cloud. Relative to normal, the least wet conditions may be in northern Scotland.
