


# Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

## General Summary for Monday, 11 September, 2023



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 11 September, 2023

Colder less humid and clearer air will gradually extend southeastwards across Britain as a cold front moves SE across Scotland and into N England. Further south, further thunderstorms, but not as widespread as on Sunday.

### Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Intermittent rain, risk lightning; cloud base slowly rising.

## Detailed Forecast for Monday, 11 September, 2023

How windy? (On the summits)	West or southwesterly, 15 to perhaps 20mph on higher tops post dawn. May drop to 10mph afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Becoming negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Thunderstorms: heavy or torrential rain</b> Bursts of rain at any time, and increasingly thunderstorms breaking out giving heavy or torrential rain.
Cloud on the hills?	<b>Extensive, particularly morning and in rain</b> Fog will blanket higher areas, sometimes forming on lower slopes particularly near the west coast during morning and then in and after rain. However, between rain, cloud base will tend to rise; later in day breaks to 750m, perhaps higher, particularly east Wales.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional hazy sunshine. Very hazy, and poor visibility in heavy rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	12C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

## Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	<b>Tuesday 12 September</b>	<b>Wednesday 13 September</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Northerly generally 15 or 20mph, but particularly Snowdon range and western summits elsewhere, perhaps 25mph.	Direction varied less than 10mph. Later southerly, perhaps 15mph by dusk.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small.</b>	<b>Negligible</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain: may clear only slowly</b> Low confidence: Overnight rain may persist into the day, or after largely clearing by about midday, a few patches return. Total rainfall small.	<b>Isolated brief showers.</b> Risk of the odd shower.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Very extensive, although will tend to improve</b>  At dawn, fog extensive higher slopes, and in places below 300m. Will probably all clear - but timing uncertain, patches may linger well into the afternoon, possibly evening.	<b>Hills extensively cloud free</b>  Cloud covering some higher slopes at times after dawn, before becoming free of cloud.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>30%</b>	<b>80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud slowly thinning and possibly later largely breaking up to give sunshine from west. Misty until rain eases, when visibility becomes excellent - though some haze may persist near the coast.	Patchwork of sun. Excellent visibility developing as haze clears.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	9C.	10C.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.	Above the summits, but a few valleys, patches of ground frost at dawn.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 12 September, 2023**

Areas or rain, strong winds and low cloud will cross Britain Wednesday night onwards, although just the hint that England and Wales will be dry next weekend. Temperatures near normal after slight frost some valleys Wednesday morning.
