

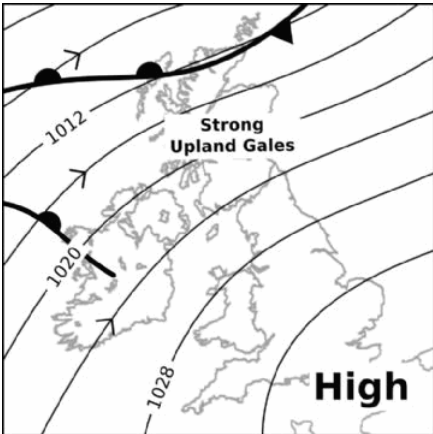

General Summary for Saturday, 27 January, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 27 January, 2024

Upland gales across Scotland and n. England. The Peak District & Wales will have slightly lighter winds. Morning cloud on windward coastal mountains may bring drizzle; cloud base rising inland. Rain and snow showers in w. & nw. Highlands. Temperatures rising through day and freezing level above most Scottish mountains by evening.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Upland wind. Extensive cloud in places

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 27 January, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Balance beginning to be affected and walking starting to feel more challenging. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly in places Risk of fine drizzle in low cloud, particularly morning in western Eryri/Snowdonia NP. Will feel damp in the air but little actual rain. Little or no dampness north and east of the A5.
Cloud on the hills?	Many summits shrouded Cloud above 600 to 800m Eryri/Snowdonia NP, lowest in western areas where cloud base will be 300 to 400m. Base rising noticeably further east and north east, including Carneddau.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% towards west coast, up to 50% inland north and east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Weak sunshine at times through high cloud. Hazy, particularly near the coast.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1 to 3C. Feeling -5 to -10C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Sunday 28 January	Monday 29 January
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 35 to 45mph.	Forecast details uncertain. Southwesterly 30 to 45mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult walking with balance and, perhaps, accuracy of foot placements affected. Beware sudden gusts on downwind slopes. Marked wind chill.	Walking arduous and balance affected. Accurate foot placement may become difficult.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Risk of isolated pockets of drizzle near west coast.	Rain on and off Rain on and off through the day, likely to ease as front moves north. Wettest in west-coastal areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Patches Patchy cloud across higher ground. May be lower and fill in near west-coastal areas at times. Well inland, much less cloud and often clear near and north of the Ogwyn valley.	Probably extensive Extensive cloud will shroud mountains from mid-slopes up. May lift in the afternoon as front moves north.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast. Hazy.	Mostly overcast and very hazy.
How Cold? (at 900m)	Around 7C, feeling as cold as -5C in the wind.	7C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to strongest winds.
Freezing Level	Above summits	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 28 January, 2024

Total rainfall will be small on Sunday but a front waving across northern England and Scotland on Monday is providing some uncertainty. England and Wales remaining mostly dry with summits above freezing Tuesday onwards. Dry spells in Scotland punctured by a series of fronts moving across bringing bouts of precipitation and freeze thaw cycles to the Highlands.
