

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## General Summary for Tuesday, 10 June, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 10 June, 2025

A fine day developing as overnight rain fades and cloud banks lift and break to reveal patchy sunshine. Early strong breezes easing gradually. Patchy cloud may come and go on higher western tops in the Highlands. Slower to improve in south Wales.

#### Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Strong breeze easing. Drizzly low cloud at first, improving.

### Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 10 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 30mph around dawn, or stronger just before - gusts over 40mph. Soon dropping during morning to 20-25mph, then 10-15mph afternoon, or less later; turning south-southwesterly into night.		
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded at first - stability may be challenged on exposed ridges - feeling chilly, but improving, becoming small during afternoon.		
How wet?	Damp at first, soon dry		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Remnants of overnight rain gives patches of drizzle at first, mostly western hills, becoming confined toward mid-Wales, soon widely fading to leave a dry day.		
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive early, lifting and breaking		
	Widespread from dawn, down to some lower slopes western hills. Tending to thin and break during the morning, leaving patches confined to higher slopes, but largely clearing by middle of day.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% early morning, rising to 90% afternoon.		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy early morning, misty start, but improving as cloud starts to break, leaving patchwork of sun and cloud into afternoon, visibility becoming excellent.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C rising to 10C. Little change, or slight rise further after dark.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits

	Wednesday 11 June	Thursday 12 June
How windy? (On the summits)  Effect of wind on you?	Southerly 15-20mph. Gradually shifting southeasterly, rising towards a gusty 30mph evening and into night.  Fairly small most of the day, though gusty at times. Walking impeded later with buffeting gusts.	Southeast then southerly, 25 to 40mph, risk gusts 50mph for a time; speeds may ease, but gusty around heavy rain.  Very blustery, walking arduous on high terrain, affecting balance on exposed tops and ridges, sudden buffeting gusts.
How wet?	Dry during daylight, chance rain late	Thunderstorms likely soon develop
(Precipitation and its impact)	Chance a few spots of rain may quickly come and go by dusk into night.	Sporadic bursts of rain from elevated cloud from dawn. Increasing threat during morning of widespread heavy rain developing from the south, lasting several hours, risk thunderstorms; may clear northward later in daytime.
Cloud on the hills?	Morning patchy cloud isolates to high tops	Lowering, varied patches in rain
	Intermittent cloud banks shroud high terrain soon after dawn, may be more persistent on southern aspects toward mid-Wales. Peaks near and north of Ogwen valley largely clear. Gradually lifting and breaking to only high tops afternoon.	Most cloud initially above the hills, but as rain develops, cloud filling in across the hills, in places patches from forest canopies upward during and after heavy bursts. May improve later in daytime.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Becoming 80%	50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun becoming frequent sun, best of sun northern low slopes. Visibility becoming excellent.	Mainly overcast, hazy, poor visibility in rain. Some sun may break through later in the day, visibility may improve.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11C rising to 16C. Little drop in temperature, if any, into night.	14C from dawn, but then little change; small variation with height in morning.

#### **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 11 June, 2025

Much warmer and feeling humid as winds shift southerly through Wednesday. Low pressure to the west and a front pushing in brings a risk of thunderstorms on Thursday, soonest in Wales, advancing northeastwards over England and Scotland likely afternoon into evening - some uncertainty of timing. Low pressure is likely to linger later week into weekend - initially staying warm and humid, bringing an ongoing risk of thundery downpours, mixed with sunnier spells. Likely cooler and windier with time over the weekend. Southwesterlies then prevailing with rain at times, most over western mountains into early next week, but a trend toward higher pressure building from the south with drier conditions emerging.
