

General Summary for Thursday, 12 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 12 June, 2025

Strong southeasterly winds, reaching gale-force with powerful gusts over mountains and to some lower slopes. Much of the Highlands dry most of daytime, but bursts of rain develop near west coast, risk thundery later. Wales sees heavy rain and thunderstorms morning into middle of day, spreading over northern England afternoon.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Thunderstorms. Strongest winds in morning.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 12 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeast then southerly, 25 to 40mph, risk gusts 50mph for a time; speeds tending to lessen into afternoon.	
Effect of wind on you?	Very blustery, walking arduous on high terrain, affecting balance on exposed tops and ridges, sudden buffeting gusts.	
How wet?	Thunderstorms likely soon develop	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Sporadic bursts of rain from elevated cloud from dawn. Increasing threat during morning of widespread heavy rain developing from the south, lasting several hours, risk thunderstorms; clearing northward later in daytime to leave patchy rain, perhaps still an odd heavier shower.	
Cloud on the hills?	Lowering, varied patches in rain	
	Most cloud initially above the hills, but as rain develops, cloud soon filling in across the hills, in places patches from forest canopies upward during and after heavy bursts. May improve later in daytime.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below	Mainly overcast, hazy, poor visibility in rain. Some sun may break through later in the day, visibility may improve.

How Cold? (at 900m)	Humid 14C from dawn, but then little change; small variation with height in morning.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly, speed may fluctuate markedly, in range 25 to 40mph, risk suddenly gusty for periods; often strongest furthest west. Expect variable conditions, at times fairly small, but more challenging for periods, often affecting balance.	Forecast uncertainty: South to southwesterly, 15 to 25mph, gusty around showers. Fairly small, but at times gusty wind may affect comfortable walking where exposed.
How wet?	Risk thundery downpours	Risk heavy showers forming
(Precipitation and its impact)	Sporadic heavy showers forming, possible localised thunderstorms developing again - timing uncertain, but greater risk more widespread toward evening.	Overnight heavy rain and thunderstorms likely soon clearing. Some patchy rain on and off, then scattered heavy showers developing, risk localised thunderstorms, clearing later.
Cloud on the hills?	Variable cloud, breaks	Lifting, may largely clear tops
	Banks of cloud at various elevations from dawn into morning, also during and after rain at any time. Greater risk of low cloud lingering toward Llyn peninsula. May largely break up for several hours at least.	Banks of cloud at various levels from dawn. Tending to rise and break up, likely to increasingly clear the hills by afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sun, mostly through high cloud. Visibility good away from rain, but likely a haze.	Broken cloud and sun. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 to 12C, humid.	10C from dawn, small variation all day, may drop a little into evening.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 13 June, 2025

Staying warm and humid into Friday, a risk of scattered thundery downpours developing. A more extensive plume of torrential rain and thunderstorms likely to advance northwards on Friday night into early Saturday, followed by further heavy and possibly thundery showers. Turning cooler over the weekend. Southwesterlies then prevailing with rain at times Sunday through Tuesday, mostly western Scotland, but a trend toward higher pressure building from the south with drier conditions emerging through mid to late next week.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Wednesday, 11 June, 2025
