

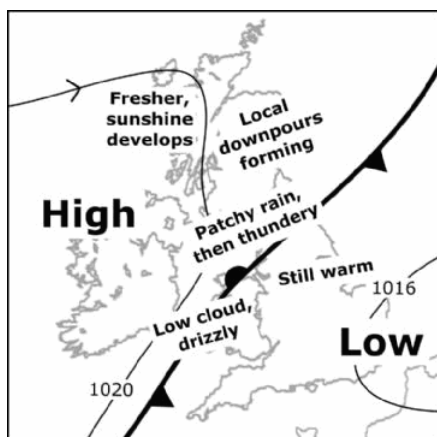

General Summary for Tuesday, 1 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 July, 2025

Cooler for Scotland and northern England. Patchy rain and low cloud across central-southern Scotland and northern England, risk of developing into slow-moving heavy downpours into the afternoon. Low cloud and a little rain for Wales. West & northwest Scotland better, cloud lifting to give sunshine near the coast. Mostly light winds.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Low cloud and drizzle, improving later. Mostly light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 1 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Variable west or southwesterly 10mph or less, may turn northerly near Anglesey and Llyn peninsula 15mph. Later typically northwesterly 10-15mph more widely, 20mph evening. Small, starting to feel breezier and cooler later.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some drizzle, chance a shower Drizzly over western hills, particularly morning. An odd shower may form inland, greater risk toward east in afternoon.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Extensive very low cloud, clearing later Low cloud / fog fairly widely in the morning, covering coastal slopes to lower elevations, higher cloud further inland, lifting above 600m. During afternoon, cloud tending to thin and break, toward evening may all clear, a few fragments left around some tops. 10% rising during afternoon to 80% later
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, some glimpses of sun toward east. Hazy or misty around many hills, particularly coasts. May improve later with some sun and very good visibility developing in west.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10 to 12C, small variation all day, still quite humid; feeling fresher later. Above the summits

Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Brief patches on some upper slopes in morning, soon clearing.	Little if any Any brief patches in morning soon lifting above tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun; increasingly sunny near coast then inland afternoon. Visibility excellent.	Patchwork of cloud and sun, becoming sunnier near coast then inland later. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C.	8 to 10C, marginal rise during day.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 2 July, 2025

Fresher westerly air into midweek. Some heavy showers forming, mostly in eastern Scotland and Pennine areas - with light winds some slow-moving heavy downpours, possible thunder locally. By Thursday, west to southwesterly winds increase for Scotland, with more persistent rain and low cloud returning from the west associated with fronts over the Atlantic. Friday brings a risk of heavier rain to western Scotland and gales over higher terrain for Scotland and possibly northern England, rain extending further south with time. The weekend looks unsettled with low pressure bringing heavy showery rain widely, risk isolated thunder.
