

General Summary for Thursday, 3 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 3 July, 2025

Southwesterly winds strengthen; showery rain becomes increasingly widespread across the Highlands, more frequent rain in western areas. Patchy rain reaches Cumbria with time as cloud thickens. Wales and south Pennines stay dry with a good deal of sunshine.

Light-moderate breeze. Fine with sunshine.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 15 to 20mph, tending to strengthen.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 40mph, speeds likely increasing during day, later 50mph higher mountains.	Southwesterly 25 to 40mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous walking conditions over the hills, may become difficult on high tops. Considerable wind chill.	Very blustery over the mountains, frequent buffeting on high tops, challenging balance where exposed; feeling cool.
How wet?	Little or no rain until late	Frequent showery rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Possibly brief drizzly showers western hills, but most of daytime likely dry. Toward evening increasing risk of persistent rain moving in from the west.	Rain on and off much of the day, at times more persistent rain. Some heavier showery bursts.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above tops much of day	Extensive, base rising
	Patches of cloud over higher slopes in morning, lifting above the tops. Toward evening, cloud banks lowering back over the tops.	Shrouding the mountains widely in morning above 400-600m, lifting gradually mostly above 700-800m, but persisting on tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, glimpses of sun in east; cloud thickening from west with time. Visibility good, later reducing in rain.	Largely cloudy, brief moments of sun. Visibility at times very good, but poor during rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C, small rise during day. Feeling near/below freezing in the wind.	9 or 10C, may drop slightly later. Feeling near/below freezing directly in the wind.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 4 July, 2025

Friday brings sustained heavy rain to western Scotland, rain extending further south with time; gales over the mountains, severe on Scotlish tops. The weekend stays unsettled, windy and rather cool with low pressure bringing heavy showery rain widely, risk isolated thunder. Next week maintains a mixed westerly regime with greatest risk of rain toward northwest Scotland, drier and warmer further south and east.
