

General Summary for Monday, 7 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 7 July, 2025

Northwesterly winds will be blustery over the mountains, feeling distinctly chilly in exposure. Plenty of dry weather, some showers toward the north and east of Scotland. Showery rain for Wales early in the day fades. Cloud clearing many tops and some sun.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy and cool. Early showery rain, then broken cloud and sun.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 7 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 25-35mph, up to 40mph at dawn. Notable gusts over high tops and down south/eastern slopes.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded in strongest wind, buffeting gusts may challenge stability in exposure. Feeling cool.
How wet?	Morning showery bursts
(Precipitation and its impact)	Several showery bursts in the morning, moving southeastwards; risk briefly heavy. Fading to substantially dry conditions.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting, largely clearing summits
	Fairly persistent over high tops from dawn, banks drifting down north and west slopes somewhat; east and south slopes substantially clear. Gradually lifting to clear summits though cloud caps may occasionally drift over highest tops later.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising to 90%
Sunshine?	Patchy sun becoming fairly extensive.
Air clarity (below cloud)	Very good visibility through some haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C rising to 8C.
	Feeling just above freezing in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

North to northwesterly 20-25mph early and late, easing a little to 15-20mph middle of day, though gusty over tops. Fairly small much of the day, may affect ease of walking early and late where exposed.	West to southwesterly 10 to 20mph. Mostly small.
Little or no rain	Possible early drizzle
Small chance local spots of drizzly rain late in the day. May be entirely dry.	Patchy drizzle or light rain early in day, fading out.
Patchy morning cloud largely clears tops	Fairly extensive, but improving
Patchy cloud drifts over high terrain early, banks occasionally pushing down slopes towards Anglesey. Lifting through morning, largely clearing summits, though always a chance of fleeing cloud caps over highest tops.	Shrouding many hills in morning, to 400-500m or lower for a time near coasts, mostly above 600m further inland. Gradually thinning during middle of day, some patches may remain near coast.
90%	20% rising to 70% afternoon.
Fairly extensive morning sunshine, high cloud building through afternoon. Very good visibility though some haze.	Mostly cloudy morning, occasional sun breaking through, more widely later. Misty coastal hills in morning; visibility becoming good below cloud.
6 or 7C, rising to 8C, further rising into night towards 10C.	12C rising to 14C, humid.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 8 July, 2025

Low pressure to the northwest maintains a humid southwesterly wind mid-late this week, with fronts situated near northwestern coasts - often extensive low cloud here with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in east and southern Scotland. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week, higher temperatures extending into Scotland with time; some mist may continue to affect coasts in the west.
