

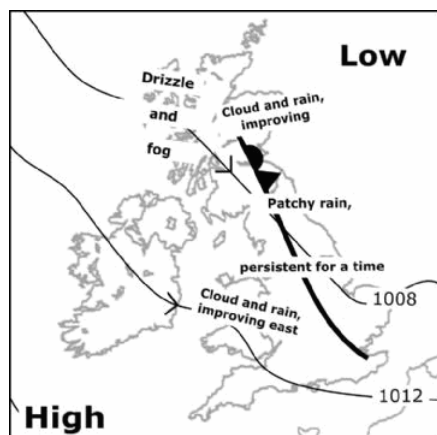

General Summary for Tuesday, 22 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 22 July, 2025

Drizzly and dull for west Scotland, rain and cloud increasingly breaking in the east with some breaks to tops. Patchy rain and morning fog across most of England and Wales too, cloud tending to lift though most tops likely remain in cloud. Cloud and drizzle will linger on west slopes of Lakeland and Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Fog and rain/drizzle, tending to improve east

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 22 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly, at times backing westerly, 15-20mph. Trending northerly as night falls.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, occasional uncomfortable gusts over high tops. Feeling cool.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and showery bursts, drizzle over high ground Showery rain for a time, most frequent before noon. Smaller amounts further inland into mid-Wales in morning. Drizzle will linger on high tops much of the day. Becoming substantially dry into evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, tending to rise Shrouding the hills widely in the morning, bases 400-600m, lowest near to coasts. Rising somewhat with time and some breaks forming east Wales, though most terrain above 800m staying in cloud.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sun. Visibility good below cloud, but reduced at times during rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C, small change all day. Feeling like 3 to 5C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 15-20mph. Shifting northerly and rising towards 25-30mph into evening.. Fairly small, walking becoming inconvenienced as evening approaches.	North to northwesterly 10-15mph. Notable gusts over tops may rise to 20mph. Fairly small, some light buffeting in gusts over high tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain north and east breaks into spots Drizzly rain in the morning on north and western slopes. Tending to fade, though high tops remain in drizzle for a time. Occasional spots of light rain drifting around.	Little or no rain Some fine drizzle around where in cloud in the morning, chance of local spots of light rain east Wales later. Otherwise dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Tending to improve, high tops stay in cloud Cloud fairly extensive above 700-800m at dawn, lower on slopes nearest to Anglesey. Bases tending to lift, but high tops likely remaining mostly shrouded. Slopes southeast of highest tops will substantially clear. 10% rising to 30%	Shrouding tops, drifting down northwest slopes From dawn, fog fairly extensive from middle slopes up, reaching lower slopes facing Anglesey. Tending to rise, though high terrain 900m and up likely remains in cloud most of the day with bases drifting down northwest slopes. 20%; rising to 60% east Wales
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, patchy sun breaking out for a time through the midday hours. Excellent visibility.	Patchy sun becomes more frequent east Wales. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9 or 10C, little change all day. Above the summits	9 or 10C, warming only slightly if at all. Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 23 July, 2025

High pressure slowly begins building on Wednesday, beginning a settling trend from the west. Some heavy rain in eastern areas will ease away on Thursday with only spotty showers remaining. Into the weekend, weather will notably settle with increasing sun across England and Wales with decent sunny spells in east Scotland. A predominantly west-southwesterly breeze will facilitate cloud and occasional rain patches into west Scotland.

A changeable outlook through late July with rain affecting all areas at times, most frequent in western Scotland, some settled periods too. Often breezy with near average temperatures.
