

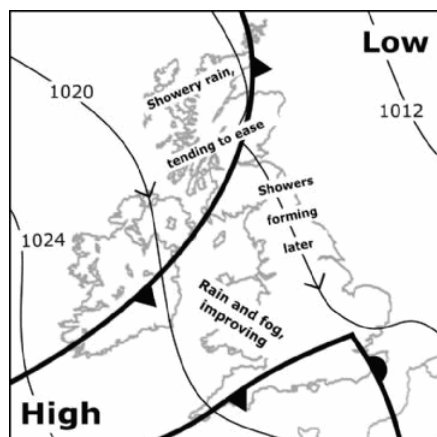

General Summary for Thursday, 31 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 31 July, 2025

Showery rain in Scotland tends to ease, cloud increasingly clearing tops of central and southeast highlands. Morning cloud and patchy rain in south Scotland and England tends to improve as well; afternoon showery outbreaks from Cheviots down the eastern Pennines. Wet and dull in Wales, improving afternoon.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Morning rain, then dry; cloud lifts, some higher breaks

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 31 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 20 to 25mph. Trending northerly and increasing into evening, 30mph or higher over tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Starting to affect balance and comfortable walking in places on exposed tops and ridges, increasingly into evening.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Morning rain, breaking into occasional showers Risk of fairly persistent rain from dawn into morning with heavy bursts. Quickly breaking into isolated showers afternoon, tending to be isolated to slopes near coasts.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lifting with some breaks, best south and east Covering the hills widely at dawn, bases down to lower slopes on coastal-facing hills. Bases rising to upper slopes with breaks forming, best south and east. High tops may see clear spells, though cloud caps regularly come and go.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%, rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sun developing, clouding over at times. Visibility reduced in rain, becoming very good away from showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10C most of the day, slightly warmer east and mid-Wales. Slightly warmer at and before dawn.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

	Friday 1 August	Saturday 2 August
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 25 to 30mph, occasional stronger breezes over tops, notably early in the day. Affecting comfortable walking and balance on some higher exposed tops and ridges. Considerable wind chill.	Northwesterly 15-20mph - tending to be stronger and gusty over high tops. Walking at times impeded during gusty spells, stability may be briefly challenged on exposed high terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers Showery rain most frequent near north-facing coasts in the morning, some showers pushing increasingly inland, tending to fade with time.	Little or no rain Chance of fleeting spots of drizzly rain onto northern and western slopes in the morning. Fading for a dry day.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Covering tops, some improvement Covering higher areas fairly widely above 700-800m in morning, locally 600m or lower for a time toward north and near Llyn peninsula. Tending to rise and break toward upper slopes in afternoon, but patches may come and go high tops. 50%	Rising and breaking, increasingly off tops Patchy cloud at various heights above 600m in the morning, possibly more extensive on northwest aspects. Tending to rise and dissipate as the day goes, high tops increasingly out of cloud. 40%, rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, most sun near coast in afternoon. Visibility becoming very good away from showers, slight coastal haze.	Mostly sunny, gradually weakened as patchy high cloud builds through afternoon. Excellent visibility, some haze near coasts later.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C rising to 8 or 9C. Feeling below freezing in the wind, nearer -5C in morning higher tops. Above the summits	8C rising to 11C - windward coastal slopes will be slow to rise. Temperatures staying elevated overnight. Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 1 August, 2025

Westerly winds prevail in the extended outlook, though the weather will be changeable. Heavy rain and strong wind is expected Saturday night and Monday, though detail remains uncertain currently. High pressure will bring a brief settled spell around midweek with a mix of cloud and sun, then occasional low pressure systems come and go - western mountains often shrouded in cloud with periods of rain, at times heavy. Some cloud and rain drifts east, mostly in Scotland. Variable winds too, at times quite blustery. Temperatures near average, variably cooler north. Ridges of higher pressure will build occasionally from the southwest for better windows of weather, particularly England & Wales.
