

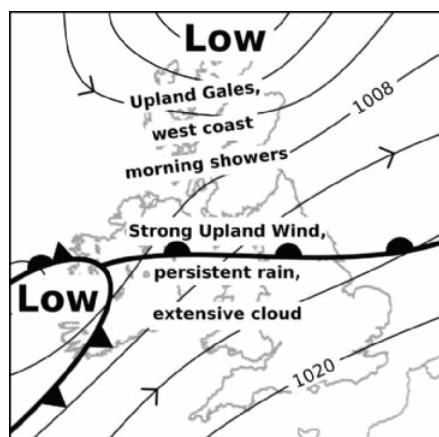

General Summary for Thursday, 18 September, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 18 September, 2025

Strong upland wind or gales across the mountains. Frontal wave bringing persistent, heavy rain and extensive cloud from North Wales to the Southern Uplands. Highlands drier, especially east of A9, but showery near the west and north-west coast in the morning. Temperatures mild but with notable wind chill.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Strong upland wind. Persistent rain & extensive cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 18 September, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 35 to 45mph, risk 50mph at times. Marked increase with height. Powerful turbulent gusts.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult walking conditions will make progress challenging. Very powerful gusts, especially in passes, may easily blow you over. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Persistent, especially west coast Soon persistent rain, possibly heavy at times, near the west coast, encroaching further in land at times mostly as light rain. West-coastal up-slopes remaining drizzly all day.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Extensive cloud down to lower west-coastal slopes. Further inland cloud base will rise to 600m in the afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sunshine. Excellent visibility inland below cloud deck; hazier near the coast.
How Cold? (at 900m)	13C. Feeling between 0 and 5C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Well above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 19 September, 2025

Weather remains mixed into and through the weekend, often with high winds, regions of persistent rain and extensive cloud. Temperatures falling through Saturday across the UK with the higher Scottish summits dropping below freezing and frosts in some glens. Looking increasingly likely that high pressure will take hold from the north on Sunday evening, bringing a period of more settled weather across the country for a couple of days at least, perhaps longer.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2025.
