

# General Summary for Tuesday, 7 October, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 7 October, 2025

A swathe of fairly persistent rain and drizzle drifts gradually southwards over Scotland into northern England, some heavier pulses of rain. Brighter skies follow across the Highlands from the northwest, cloud base rising, brief showers. Wales has low cloud and drizzle in west. Gusty southwesterlies.

#### Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy, gusts near-gale force. Drizzle, low cloud west, wetter later.

# **Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 7 October, 2025**

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph, very gusty in places on tops and ridges, locally also passes, speeds likely to vary during day, occasional 40mph high tops.	
Effect of wind on you?	Buffeting gusty winds will make walking strenuous in exposure and affect balance, but in places at times smaller effects.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its	Drizzle, steadier rain later in day Small amounts of rain in total, but often feeling damp across the hills, some periods of	
impact)	constant drizzle over western slopes. Late in the day, more persistent and steadier rain developing from north.	
Cloud on the hills? Extensive, lowest west, some breaks east		
	Shrouding the mountains widely above 400-600m in western areas, to some lower slopes on Llyn peninsula and west coast. Higher bases above 600-700m toward and north of Ogwen, also Berwyn group.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%, to 50% eastern mid-Wales.	
Sunshine?	ne? Largely cloudy, often dull western areas, hazy at best.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Locally brighter east Wales, better visibility.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 or 8C, little change all day, then into night dropping to 4C. Directly in the wind feeling near/below 0C.

### **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 8 October, 2025

Strong westerly winds prevail into the second half of this week, gale-force over Scottish mountains; prepare for considerable chill factor. Drizzly rain and low cloud most persistent western areas. Pressure gradually rises from the south, improving conditions toward the weekend as wind drops lighter, most places become dry and cloud tends to break. Northwest Scotland likely to hold on to stronger winds, cloud and some drizzle into Saturday. Scope for inversion conditions to develop with some valley fog and varied low cloud. Settled weather is likely to continue into next week, with pleasant days and cool nights.
