

General Summary for Monday, 3 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 3 November, 2025

Gale to, in places, severe gale force south-westerlies will drive in very extensive low cloud across the hills and rainfall. The rain will be near constant across western mountains, and on and off across eastern areas. Significant wind chill.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

South-westerly gales with persistent and often heavy rain and extensive hill fog.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 3 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 45-55mph, may lift above 60mph into afternoon. Perhaps 70mph western coastal hills.		
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult if not in the afternoon very difficult walking and significant wind chill.		
How wet?	Persistent rain		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle most of the day, heaviest and persistent western mountains. Very wet underfoot with local flood risk.		
	Progressively less wet north across Carneddau and east toward Berwyn mountains.		
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive		
	Widely shrouding the mountains from 200 or 300m up, although progressively north of the A5 and east toward the Berwyn mountains, the cloud base rising to around 650m.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost nil		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensively dull and misty with visibility poor in heavier rain.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C. Feeling below freezing in direct wind.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits

	Tuesday 4 November	Wednesday 5 November
How windy? (On the summits)	South to higher up southwesterly 40 to 50mph.	Southerly 30 to 40mph in morning, easing down to 15 to 25mph in afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Continued difficult conditions where exposed on higher areas, where wind chill will be significant and walking a struggle.	Be prepared for arduous conditions in the morning with considerable wind chill. Easing into afternoon.
How wet?	Frequent or persistent rain.	Frequent rainfall
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain most or all day. Breaks in the rain most likely east Wales. On western mountains, very wet underfoot and streams in spate with possible flooding.	Frequent pulses of at times heavy rainfall feeding up from the south. May set in through afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive.	Extensive
	Widely persistent fog above 200 to 400m. Near and north from the A5 and toward Berwyn moutnains, higher cloud base, may reach 750m.	Low cloud will blanket the hills in fog, down to the very lowest slopes across southern ranges and up the west coast.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little if any sun: mostly dull and misty.	Overcast. Visibility often poor due to rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C Will feel as cold as minus 5C directly in the wind.	9C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 4 November, 2025

Remaining very unsettled with as a series of deep Atlantic lows, and their associated fronts, continue to cross Britain over the next week to ten days. Frequently windy, with high rainfall, particularly on western mountains (rain at some stage almost daily) and cloud will frequently cover higher areas. Only rarely cold enough for snow higher mountains in Scotland.
