

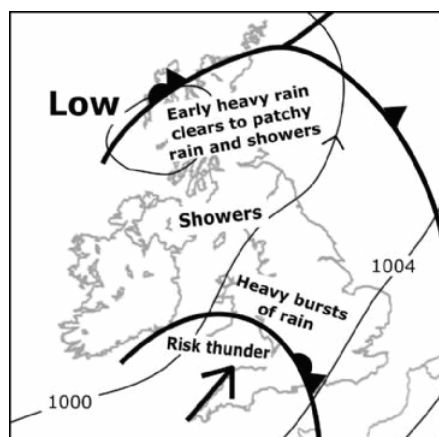

General Summary for Monday, 10 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 November, 2025

Heavy rain for much of the Highlands from dawn into the morning, moving northwards, clearing to leave patchy rain, local showers in west; cloud base rising. Some showery rain in the Lakes, drier Pennines. Showers in Wales merging into clusters of heavy rain. Moderate to locally gusty southerly winds.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Gusty winds. Rain and showery bursts become frequent.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 10 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly, 15 to 30mph, speeds likely to vary, suddenly gusty around bursts of rain.
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling noticeably blustery at times on exposed higher terrain; may start to affect comfortable walking; marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early showers, then more frequent bursts Showery rain from before dawn, largely clearing, but brief showers may remain. Drier for a few hours in morning, but into middle of day increasing risk heavy bursts of rain becoming frequent from south.
Cloud on the hills?	Often covering hills, varied extent Shrouding higher areas most of the day, some breaks occasionally to upper slopes, mainly northern areas in the morning. Base lowering in rain, more extensive above 600-700m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A little sun mostly north in morning. Visibility good when dry, becoming poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 or 5C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to wind, nearer -5C at times on high tops.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly, strengthening rapidly overnight up to dawn, 45 to 60mph all day, often 70mph western high tops. Difficult walking conditions, any mobility challenging around some high tops. Marked wind chill despite mild air.	South-southwesterly 20-30mph, possibly less for a time, but risk strengthening later, 40mph into evening. Risk blustery over exposed terrain, though may be fairly small for periods. Later in day possibly deteriorating.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain often heavy, setting in afternoon Several hours of constant rain from dawn, heavy over western hills, fading for a few hours to lighter rain and drizzle, but likely during afternoon prolonged heavier rain setting in again onward into evening.	Patchy drizzle, then risk heavier rain Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following previous rain. Patchy drizzly rain mostly western hills, increasing risk with time of more persistent then heavier rain returning.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest southwest Blanket low cloud across hills, to lower elevations near coasts in west. Mostly above 600m inland with some higher breaks north/east of the A5.	Fairly extensive, some breaks north Banks of cloud from lower elevations upward in the morning, may linger particularly western hills. Breaks mostly Carneddau. Lowering widely in rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Below 10%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and murky, better visibility locally toward north if drier for a time.	Overcast, varied layers of cloud. Misty areas may linger, locally good visibility mainly toward north.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	Rising from before dawn to 6C, soon up to 8 or 9C; only small fall with height. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind. Above the summits	8C. Feeling like 0C or below if in stronger wind. Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 11 November, 2025**

Unsettled south-southwesterlies through midweek, periods of heavy rain widespread, further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Mountain gales on Tuesday for England, Wales, S & E Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland, but still generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week, colder air pushes into Scotland, dropping below freezing over the mountains, with some snow over higher terrain in the Highlands on Thursday-Friday; strong to gale force easterly winds develop widely. Colder northeasterly air is expected to become more widespread into the weekend and next week.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 9 November, 2025
