

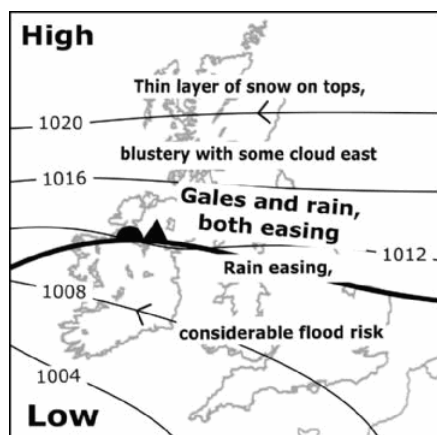
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Saturday, 15 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 15 November, 2025

High fog banks in the east Scottish Highlands, dry with sunshine west; windy early but easing. A thin layer of snow blankets the summits. Early gales in England and north Wales ease but remaining blustery. Rain here too, also easing though lingering south Pennines. Flood risk in Wales and south Pennines.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Flood risk, rain fading; early gales, easing

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 15 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 40-50mph from dawn, powerful gusts downslope to west. Tending to ease during morning, mostly in the south where speeds drop towards 20mph afternoon. May remain closer to 30mph over northern tops. Difficult walking at first with wind chill; turbulent gusts over most high terrain are likely all day though a general improvement in conditions.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain fades into high terrain drizzle; flooding Continuing rain from overnight through dawn, but intensity easing and gradually becoming patchier during the day. Most rain will fade afternoon but fine drizzle will linger in cloud over high slopes. Considerable flooding expected.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Extensive Covering the hills widely, lowest bases in eastern areas around 400-600m, some higher breaks in the west though unlikely above 700m. 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, some brighter skies may develop toward west coast. Visibility largely poor though some improvement as rain eases.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	3 or 4C - little change with height above 700m. Temperatures a degree warmer on western slopes, perhaps several degrees warmer mid-Wales. Wind chill feeling like -10C in exposure early in the day. Above the summits.

	Sunday 16 November	Monday 17 November
How windy? (On the summits)	East to northeasterly 20-25mph, to gusty 35mph in places around high tops and some passes, gusty downslope to west.	Northerly 25-35mph. Likely easing, possibly a northwesterly shift as well though detail is uncertain.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery, some buffeting gusts in places, not just on highest terrain; considerable wind chill in exposure.	Walking strenuous with wind chill in the morning, trending towards lesser impacts.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Light showers A little rain in the wind at times, occasional light showery rain mostly Carneddau to areas near Bala, mainly morning.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early cloud slowly lifting and breaking Banks of cloud drifting over slopes above 600 to 800m in the morning, lowest and most extensive in areas toward north and east though perhaps more widespread. Tending to lift and break, western tops becoming often clear.	Only high slopes of northern hills Cloud will come and go on high northern slopes likely all day, most frequently around Carneddau. Hills clear elsewhere, some local valley fog patches are possible.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 70%	60% northernmost tops, 90% elsewhere
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, sun breaking through with time, notably west. Visibility tending to improve to be very good.	A patchwork of cloud and sun on northernmost slopes, sunshine elsewhere. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2 or 3C (small change of temperature with height above 700m). Dropping slightly. Feeling like -5 to -8C in exposure to wind.	0C, dropping a degree. Feeling like -10C in strongest morning wind.
Freezing Level	Lowering to just above freezing on upper slopes.	900m at dawn, lowering to 700-800m. Frost is likely to lower elevations at dawn as well.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 16 November, 2025

Rain eases in Wales and the southern Pennines though flood risk may linger for another day .

Winds shift widely northerly as the weekend turns into next week, drawing cold air widely across the country; staying below freezing over higher mountains most likely throughout the next week to 10 days. Snow flurries move in on this northerly wind on slopes exposed to coasts; snow most frequent toward north of the Highlands with some locally more substantial accumulations over higher terrain; some accumulating upland snow possible more widely during Tuesday as a front drifts southward. Elsewhere, sunny breaks will occur at times frequent and prolonged. Winds often strong, at times gale force; significant wind chills likely.
