

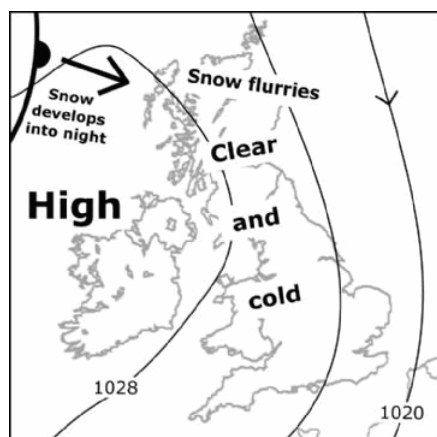

General Summary for Monday, 17 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 17 November, 2025

Cold everywhere, staying sub-zero over high terrain, plus some frost lower down in morning; considerable chill factor if exposed to wind, but speeds tending to lessen all areas. Largely dry, local snow flurries moving in northern Scotland. Some patchy cloud mostly northern half of the Highlands, sunnier elsewhere.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Strongest wind early, easing. Sun and patchy cloud north.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 17 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	North-northeasterly 20 to 30mph in morning, strongest around dawn. Easing gradually, to 10-15mph midday into early afternoon, turning northwesterly. Rising from dusk to 20-25mph, tater 30mph into night. Walking briefly strenuous with considerable wind chill in the morning, trending towards minimal impacts.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Precipitation unlikely Broadly dry all day, small chance brief spots or light snowflakes on northern mountains.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Only high slopes of northern hills Cloud will come and go on high northern slopes likely all day, most frequently around Carneddau around 800m. Hills clear elsewhere. 60% northernmost tops, 90% elsewhere
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sun on northernmost slopes, sunshine elsewhere. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	-1C Feeling like -10C in strongest morning wind. 700-800m. Frost some inland lower elevations at dawn as well.

	Tuesday 18 November	Wednesday 19 November
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 25-30mph at dawn, slowly strengthening, up to 35-40mph+ over tops into nighttime. Walking likely strenuous much of the day with wind chill; conditions slowly deteriorating, particularly into night.	Northerly 35 to 40mph, squally gusts in showers. Often challenging walking conditions on higher exposed terrain, significant wind chill, severe in places higher up.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, then rain slowly sets in Scattered showers onto western hills through the morning, some snow flurries on the high tops. Showers merging into larger areas of rain, extending further inland and setting in for periods.	Locally frequent snow and hail Snow and hail showers coming in frequently from the north, locally banding together to give lines of more constant precipitation, mainly Snowdon range westward. Chance of isolated lightning.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Banks west, more widely afternoon Banks of cloud come and go above 600m on western hills from dawn. High breaks east, particularly Berwyn group where summits may be often clear for several hours. Cloud fills in more widely and often as rain sets in. 50% lowering to 20%	Fairly extensive higher northern areas Cloud base constantly changing, but often shrouding north-facing mountains above 600-800m, some lower shafts of cloud in showers. Brief breaks higher up mostly inland, best south of Bala. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright in the east in the morning, trending overcast with a few brighter spells. Excellent visibility, turning poor with rain, very poor on high ground.	Brief bursts of sun, mostly inland and southwards. Visibility at times appalling when in cloud and snow, but intermittently very good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	0 or 1C. Feeling like -10C in direct wind. 800-900m, including frosts in sheltered valleys. May rise to or above the high tops.	-3C. Wind chill feeling like -15C to near -20C in stronger speeds. 600m, also frost in some inland valleys after dawn, again soon from dusk.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 18 November, 2025**

A cold week ahead, staying below freezing across all mountains, much terrain will be frozen from valleys upward. An area of low pressure and associated fronts will pass southeastward during Tuesday, bringing some persistent snowfalls, including to lower slopes particularly inland across the Highlands, some substantial accumulations over higher terrain. Strong to gale force northerlies Wednesday-Thursday, bringing snow and hail showers focused on northern Scotland and onto north-facing coastal districts elsewhere. By Friday into next weekend, winds shift back westerly and freezing levels rise to upper slopes - some rain likely, snow on high tops at times.

Forecast issued at 15:00 on Sunday, 16 November, 2025
