

General Summary for Saturday, 29 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 29 November, 2025

Snow showers toward northern Scotland, but much of the Highlands will be dry - sunshine and cloud breaks best toward southwest; sub-zero on tops, chilly northerly breeze. England and Wales sees rain fairly widely, snow falling on higher tops; wind very variable, but risk gales developing.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Rain and snow on tops becoming heavier, risk of gales later.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 29 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Some uncertainty remains as a complex weather system moves slowly: Westerly 20mph, possibly less for a few hours. In afternoon shifting northerly, risk rapid increase to 40mph toward/soon after dusk.		
Effect of wind on you?	Likely fairly small for several hours, but be aware of possibly rapidly worsening conditions late in the day, significant wind chill developing.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Increasingly wet, snow on tops Rain on and off at least from dawn into morning, but likely increasingly setting in for constant heavier falls north/west areas, particularly afternoon, falling as snow over higher terrain, by dusk to 700m, possibly 500m into evening.		
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Extensive higher areas Hills shrouded by cloud most or all day, most extensive in constant rain/snow. Occasional breaks to 600-700m or above may form mainly inland and eastern hills.		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast. Visibility mostly poor due to rain or increasingly very poor on the tops due to snow.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C, dropping to -2C from dusk. Feeling like -10C, risk -15C if wind speed increases late in day.		
Freezing Level	900m, dropping into evening to 600-700m.

	Sunday 30 November	Monday 1 December
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	NW'ly 20-30mph early morning, strongest around dawn, easing W-SW'ly 15mph. Increasing into night S'ly 50-60mph. Marked wind chill and blustery at first, likely to soon lessen. Deteriorating into night.	Some uncertainty: South to southwesterly 45 to 60mph, may vary during day, but any lower speeds likely short-lived. Expect difficult conditions most or all day, challenging balance, gusts may knock you over; significant wind chill.
How wet?	Local brief showers, flurries tops	Prolonged heavy rain likely
(Precipitation and its impact)	Wet underfoot, or icy on higher terrain with possible fresh snow on tops from overnight. Brief light showers mostly near to coasts in morning, snow flurries above 800m, fading.	Rain rarely ceasing all day, sustained heavy falls particularly western hills. Very wet underfoot with flooding developing.
Cloud on the hills?	Most common higher western tops	Extensive
	Cloud likely to often cap higher slopes in the morning, may come and go all day nearer to western coasts, but some breaks likely. Best clearer spells to tops further inland and eastwards.	Blanket cloud across the hills, to mid-slopes or lower on west coast hills. Highest cloud base toward north of Ogwen valley, at times above 700m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud and patchy sun. Visibility excellent out of cloud.	Overcast and dull. Poor visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0 or -1C, then rising after dark. Feeling like -8C if exposed to wind in morning.	6C, later in day starting to drop. Wind chill feeling like -7C in exposure on higher areas.
Freezing Level	800 to 900m; lifting above tops later evening into night.	Rising from overnight, staying above freezing to the tops all daytime. May then lower into night onto higher tops.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 30 November, 2025

After a lull on Sunday, areas of low pressure then circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern into next week, bringing generally unsettled weather. Southwesterly air and briefly milder into Monday, with rain for most places at times, but prolonged heavier rain for England and Wales. Then typically cooler with showery conditions - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week - some snow on tops, occasional hail. Wind speed likely to vary, some squally gusty spells, but also some lulls possible during the week ahead.
