

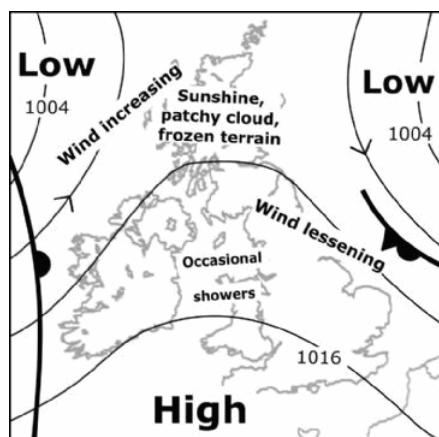

General Summary for Sunday, 30 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 November, 2025

A fine day for many places, sunshine and broken cloud. Much terrain frozen in the Highlands, where a lull in wind, later strengthening southerlies in west. Strong northwesterlies for England and Wales tend to drop. Some local showers move inland from the Irish Sea. Deteriorating all areas into night.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Chilly breeze, gales into night. A few showers, some sun.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 30 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 20-30mph up to dawn, soon easing westerly 15mph, then in afternoon southwesterly 20mph. Increasing into night southerly 50-65mph. Marked wind chill and blustery at first, soon lessening. Deteriorating into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Brief showers, flurries tops; rain into night Wet underfoot, or icy on higher terrain with a dusting of fresh snow on some tops, mainly in northern areas. Occasional showers mostly near to west coasts, snow flurries above 800m. Onward into night, rain moves in from west, setting in heavy.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Most common higher western tops Cloud likely to often cap higher slopes in the morning, may come and go all day nearer to western coasts, but some breaks likely. Best clearer spells to tops further inland and eastwards. 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud and patchy sun; high cloud builds later in day from west. Visibility excellent out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	0 or -1C, then rising after dark, reaching 5C by middle of night. Feeling like -8C if exposed to wind early morning. 800 to 900m; lifting above tops later evening into night.

	Monday 1 December	Tuesday 2 December
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 45 to 60mph much of the daytime, powerful gusts in places downslope to north; may lessen later.	Southwesterly 20 to 25mph, at times squally gusts 30-35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions most or all day, challenging balance, gusts may knock you over; significant wind chill.	Breezy, at times more blustery over tops, starting to affect comfortable walking and balance on ridges. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Prolonged heavy rain Rain rarely ceasing all day, sustained heavy falls particularly western hills. Breaking up into showers into night. Very wet underfoot with flooding developing.	Frequent hail showers west; flooding Showery bursts coming inland from Cardigan Bay, with hail, at times snow falling on highest tops; chance isolated thunder. More often dry eastern hills. Wet underfoot, streams in spate, possible flooding after previous rain.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Blanket cloud across the hills, to mid-slopes or lower on west coast hills. Highest cloud base toward north of Ogwen valley, at times above 700m.	Mostly western tops Often covering western hills, bases varied above 600 to 900m, lowest and most persistent near west coast up to Llyn peninsula. Best breaks toward northeast from Ogwen and hills around Bala/Berwyn.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	30% west, to 60% inland/north/east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull. Poor visibility.	Glimpses of sun mostly toward east and north, where visibility often very good. Reduced to poor at times in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C, later in day starting to drop. Wind chill feeling like -7C in exposure on higher areas.	1 or 2C. Wind chill feeling like -5 to -8C.
Freezing Level	Rising from overnight, staying above freezing to the tops all daytime. May then lower into night onto higher tops.	1000m or just above.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 1 December, 2025

Areas of low pressure circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern in the week ahead, bringing generally unsettled weather. Southwesterly air and briefly milder into Monday - prolonged heavy rain for England and Wales bringing renewed concern for flooding. Then typically cooler with showery conditions - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week - some snow on tops, occasional hail. Wind speed likely to vary, some squally gusty spells, but also some lulls possible during the week.

Forecast issued at 7:00 on Sunday, 30 November, 2025
