

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General Summary for Monday, 1 December, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 December, 2025

Morning rain and snow in Scottish Highlands breaks for several hours then returns from the south later. Rain more persistent over the Southern Uplands with heavy bursts south and a risk of strong winds. Gales and rain widely across England and Wales, increasing risk of flooding in Lakeland and west Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Gales, risk severe; near-constant heavy rain, rising flood risk

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 1 December, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 45 to 55mph much of the daytime, risk stronger for several hours afternoon, up to 70mph. Powerful gusts in places downslope to north.	
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions most or all day, challenging balance; gusts may knock you over, not just on highest tops. Significant wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Near-constant rain, incessant and often heavy west Rain rarely ceasing all day, incessant with prolonged heavy falls on hills facing Cardigan Bay. Breaking up into showers overnight. Very wet underfoot with flooding developing.	
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free	Extensive Blanket cloud across the hills, to mid-slopes or lower on west coast hills. Highest cloud base toward north of Ogwen valley, at times above 700m.	
summits? Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull. Poor visibility.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C, beginning to drop afternoon then quite suddenly after nightfall towards 3C. Wind chill feeling like -7C in exposure on higher areas.	
Freezing Level	Rising from overnight, staying above freezing to the tops all daytime. May then lower overnight onto or just above highest tops.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25-30mph, at times squally gusts 35mph.	Southwesterly 25-30mph, some stronger gusts in exposure.
Effect of wind on you?	Breezy, at times more blustery over tops, starting to affect comfortable walking and balance on ridges. Marked wind chill.	Comfort of walking affected, particularly in exposure where conditions will be more strenuous. Feeling cool.
How wet?	Frequent hail showers west; flooding	Showers onto western slopes
(Precipitation and its impact)	Showery bursts coming inland from Cardigan Bay, with hail, at times snow falling on highest tops; chance isolated thunder. More often dry eastern hills. Wet underfoot, streams in spate, possible flooding after previous rain.	Frequent showers onto high tops and western slopes facing the Lleyn Peninsula and Cardigan Bay; showers tending to merge into areas of rain afternoon. Substantially dry all day Carneddau and east Wales.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly tops and western slopes	Covering high tops and western slopes
	Often covering western hills, bases varied above 600 to 800m, lowest and most persistent near west coast up to Llyn peninsula. Best breaks toward northeast from Ogwen and hills around Bala/Berwyn.	Shrouding the high tops with bases as low as 600m on slopes facing Cardigan Bay. More patchy with high bases east Wales. A rising trend late in the day with some breaks off eastern tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% west, to 60% inland/north/east.	20%, rising to 50% east
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mostly toward east and north, where visibility often very good. Reduced to poor at times in showers.	Glimpses of sun east Wales, increasingly frequent later; likely overcast west. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1 or 2C. Wind chill feeling like -5 to -8C.	1 or 2C. Feeling like -10C in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Just above the summits	Just above the highest tops

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 2 December, 2025

A risk of local flooding remains on Tuesday in Wales and the Lake district following Monday's heavy rain. Areas of low pressure circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern in the week ahead, bringing generally unsettled weather. Temperatures near average - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week. Often showery and cloudy in the west with broader bands of rain regularly passing east. Wind speed likely to vary though often quite strong with risk of gales coming and going. First indications suggest unsettled weather will remain dominant into the weekend.
