


Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Sunday, 25 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 January, 2026

Blustery for most, gales in Scotland which will be severe on high tops early. Continued snow and local whiteout conditions on high terrain in east Scotland, snowdrifts build here. Often raining over the Pennines and south Wales, more intermittent in north Wales and Lakeland (sleet or snow on high summits).

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery; patchy rain and often foggy, mostly east

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 25 January, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 30-40mph, locally stronger gusts around high tops and downslope to NW. Speeds trending towards the lower end of the range though will be variable.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over most high terrain, particularly early when strongest gusts will challenge balance. Considerable wind chill.
How wet?	Patchy rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional rain, most frequent or persistent over eastern Wales, patchier westwards. Falling as sleet or snow on the high summits.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive
	Covering many high tops all day, lowest and most persistent cloud east and mid-Wales down to middle or lower slopes. Higher cloud and some breaks further northwestward, rare breaks above 700-800m here.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%
Sunshine?	Largely cloudy, some haze building with time.
Air clarity (below cloud)	Poor visibility over many hills in fog and precipitation, brighter and locally good visibility toward northwest.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1C. Feeling like -8 to -12C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Close to freezing on higher summits around 1000m.

	Monday 26 January	Tuesday 27 January
How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 30mph at dawn, steadily increasing to a gusty 45-50mph by dusk, strengthening further after dark.	Southeasterly 50-60mph at/before dawn, easing to nearer 45-50mph, though some variability.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking from dawn, deteriorating, challenging by dusk with buffeting. Significant wind chill.	Mobility challenged likely all day, difficult early; strongest wind requires crouching for stability. Severe wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain sets in afternoon, summit snow Mostly dry morning, a few spots of sleet on eastern hills. Rain gradually arrives through afternoon, gradually becoming widespread into night and falling as snow on the high summits.	Often snowing Snowing most of the morning. May become more on-and-off in the afternoon with the snow level rising to middle slopes, though also possible setting back in for periods.
Cloud on the hills?	Becoming extensive afternoon Patchy cloud on the upper slopes and summits, some breaks but more extensive east Wales. Becoming extensive afternoon as rain sets in with bases lowering to middle slopes at least.	Fairly extensive Extensive cloud over the summits and upper slopes of Snowdonia and mid-Wales, likely all day. Western slopes may see some local higher breaks with time, though always a risk of lowering again.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%, later 10%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little sunshine expected. Good visibility at first, turning poor as rain sets in.	Mostly cloudy, a few bright moments may break out afternoon. Visibility often very poor in precipitation, though local improvements afternoon.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-1C, rising slightly with time.	-1C, lifting to 0 or +1C by afternoon. Feeling like -17C or colder in direct wind.
Freezing Level	600-700m, lifting slightly afternoon.	Most terrain frozen from dawn, generally lifting though variable, only high terrain frozen by dusk.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 26 January, 2026**

An unsettled week ahead: a dominance of low pressure will bring periods of wet weather and gales (at times severe), to all areas. Winds will be predominantly east-southeasterly, particularly in Scotland, maintaining the cold air with freezing levels consistently to middle or lower slopes - wind chills will be severe. A near-term risk of flooding in the eastern highlands.

Wind direction will be more variable in England and Wales, at times shifting south-southwesterly and drawing in milder air, bringing freezing levels to upper slopes or even above the high summits.

Low cloud often covering many hills with only local sunny breaks here and there.
