

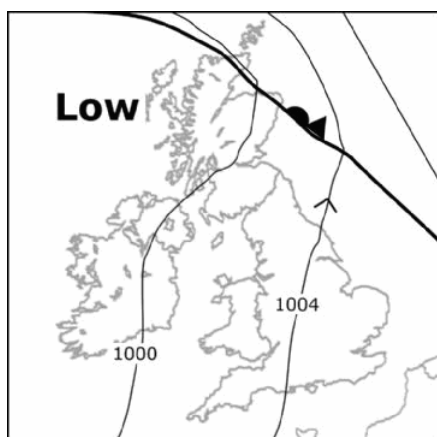
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Sunday, 8 February, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 8 February, 2026

Little change with rain or on higher areas in Scotland snow on and off - showery in character Wales; and the mountains extensively foggy. Fairly light wind - except in northern Scotland at first.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Increasingly showery; extensive fog. Light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 8 February, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 15 to on higher tops 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers Rain now and again, particularly afternoon when falling as heavy showers with risk hail.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive on higher slopes. Cloud base typically 600 to 800m, rare breaks to higher tops, but nearer 300m in rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Less than 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine; visibility very good, but poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Monday 9 February	Tuesday 10 February
How windy? (On the summits)	South-easterly 20 to 30mph, perhaps strengthening to 35-40mph at times western coastal hills.	Southerly 20 or 25mph; although risk of strengthening toward 40mph late in day.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery and gusty for periods, especially western coastal hills, where perhaps fairly arduous. Considerable wind chill.	Mostly fairly small, but anticipate increasingly arduous walking late in day
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patches or spots of rain here and there Within an overcast environment, here and there patches, or occasional spots, of rain, particularly southern and eastern areas.	Occasional rain It may stay dry much of or all day following overnight rain - that may linger until after dawn - and further rain approaching from south toward evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, best breaks west coast. Extensive low cloud covering the mountains, cloud base between 700 and 900m, although lower in rain.	Most higher mountains persistently foggy At first, there may be persistent fog above 400 to 600m. Will tend to improve as breaks develop to 750 to perhaps 900m, possibly temporarily clearing to highest tops. But cloud base dropping again in rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast. General haze, extensive areas of mist and murk.	Occasional sunshine, mostly lower slopes north of Snowdon. Mostly very good or excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C	2C
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Just above highest summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 9 February, 2026

Little change over the next few days with continued foggy conditions over most mountains, and rain, or on higher mainly Scottish areas snow. Intermittently southeasterly winds approaching gale force.
Later in the week, progressively colder from the north with fresh snow on many mountains.
