



General Summary for Monday, 9 February, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 February, 2026

Overall very little change with occasional rain, or on higher slopes in Scotland, snow. Fog persistent on nearly all mountain areas. The wind continuing fairly light. Wales will from the southwest become windy with pulses of showery rain.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Increasingly windy. Showery rain on and off.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 9 February, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southeasterly 25mph, strengthening to 35-40mph from southwest middle of day onwards.
Effect of wind on you?	Considerable wind chill and walking frequent arduous - balance may well be difficult where exposed.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, mainly afternoon Often dry, but mainly afternoon, patches of showery rain lasting an hour or two will move northwards.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive on higher areas. Extensive low cloud covering the mountains, cloud base between 600 and 800m, although lower in rain. Perhaps temporary breaks above 900m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A little sun here and there, but generally cloudy. Very good or excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 10 February	Wednesday 11 February
How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 20 or 25mph; although risk of strengthening toward 40mph late in day.	Confidence in forecast is low: Southwest or westerly in the range 15 to perhaps 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly fairly small, but anticipate increasingly arduous walking late in day	May be fairly small, but may impede ease of walking on higher area.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional rain It may stay dry much of or all day following overnight rain - that may linger until after dawn - and further rain approaching from south toward evening.	Intermittent rain Rain and drizzle from time to time.
Cloud on the hills?	Most higher mountains persistently foggy At first, there may be persistent fog above 400 to 600m. Will tend to improve as breaks develop to 750 to perhaps 900m, possibly temporarily clearing to highest tops. But cloud base dropping again in rain.	Very extensive Most hills persistently cloud covered above 500 to 750m; perhaps breaks toward 900m east Wales.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	Less than 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine, mostly lower slopes north of Snowdon. Mostly very good or excellent visibility.	Little or perhaps no sun. Extensively cloudy; visibility mostly very good or excellent but poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C	0C.
Freezing Level	Just above highest summits.	900m.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 10 February, 2026**

A change from mid week as a low centre crosses Britain bringing stronger wind and initially rain. But precipitation will turn to snow Scottish Highlands on Wednesday then progressively southwards into England and Wales on Thursday - with most terrain frozen and fresh snow lying on most mountains by Friday morning. Cold 'winter' conditions will then persist through next weekend.
