


Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Tuesday, 24 February, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 24 February, 2026

Widely windy, gales over high terrain and more widely Scottish Highlands. Most rain in northwest Scotland with extensive coastal cloud, some drizzle on other high northwestern terrain with low cloud, most persistent on south/west aspects. Largely dry central and east areas, early low cloud, sun breaks with time.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Very windy, gales in exposure; most cloud west, some drizzle

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 24 February, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 35 to 40mph, but strong gusts may reach 45mph+ over high Snowdon group tops. A southerly trend with time and wind easing slightly in east Wales.
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions, frequent buffeting in exposure necessitates constant effort to maintain balance; considerable wind chill despite milder air. May improve slightly, greatest chance east.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly dry, some drizzle west Spotty drizzle mostly areas toward west of Yr Wyddfa / Snowdon group and onto Llyn peninsula. Damp where in cloud elsewhere. Drier east Wales.
Cloud on the hills?	Most persistent west coast, some improvement Low cloud likely to cover west coastal areas, to some lower slopes. Mostly above 700m north from Ogwen and eastern hills. A chance of improvement afternoon, lifting bases with breaks near or to summits north and east.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy in the morning, murky toward Cardigan Bay, locally better visibility north and eastward. With time, improving more widely with good sun breaks in the afternoon though some haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	3 or 4C from dawn, rising to 6C. In exposure to wind, feeling like -5 to -8C.
Freezing Level	Above all summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South-southwesterly 30-40mph, notable gusts including lower slopes. Greatest risk of strong wind near Anglesey. Strenuous walking much of the day; wind chill and notable buffeting, strongest gusts challenging stability.	Southwesterly 35-45mph. A risk of speeds reaching 50mph for periods in the afternoon. Strenuous-to-arduous walking all day, most powerful wind requiring bracing/crouching for stability; significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some light rain Drizzly rain often affects the high summits and upper slopes towards Cardigan Bay. With time, a risk of rain arrives from the west, becoming more widespread into evening.	Rain on-and-off Periods of rain come and go through the day, often patchy and light Carneddau and Berwyn groups. Between pulses of rain, spotty rain in the wind continues to affect slopes facing Cardigan Bay.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive western slopes Extensive fog from middle elevations up on slopes facing Cardigan Bay, from Yr Wyddfa (Snowdon) south to Penygader. Higher bases Carneddau and Berwyn groups, some chance of clear summits early. More widely extensive with time. 30%, lowering with time.	Extensive over high terrain, lowest west Fog shrouds high summits likely all day, the lowest bases on slopes facing Cardigan bay, often to 700m and at times lower. Patchier with higher bases to the east and Carneddau, small chance of breaks towards summits here during drier periods. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright/sunny breaks for a time to the north and east. Good visibility where out of cloud and rain though some haze.	Often cloudy, though a period of brighter skies/sun breaks is possible. Mixed visibility, good out of fog/rain, but a haze towards the sea.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6 or 7C. Feeling near or just below freezing in direct wind. Above the summits.	3 or 4C. Feeling like -8 to -10C in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 25 February, 2026

West to southwesterly winds prevail from mid-week into the weekend as areas of low pressure move toward northwest Scotland; regular rainfall here, most frequent and heavy over western mountains. Bands of rain from the west also affecting England and Wales. Milder temperatures from mid-week with freezing levels above all summits for a few days, substantial thawing to the summits in England and Wales, some high slope thawing in Scotland too. Extensive gales, only a brief easing on Wednesday, then soon unsettled again with cooler temperatures returning, showery west with bands of rain passing east, some snow on Scottish Munros. Some drier, brighter weather is possible over the weekend, though interruptions by bands of rain are likely with low confidence in detail.
