


Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Monday, 9 March, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 March, 2026

Humid air will bring extensive low cloud and bursts of showery rain to the mountains. However, in places breaks in the low cloud will allow sunshine through, whilst the cloud base will be very varied - making detail difficult. Windy northern and western Scottish Highlands.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Bursts of showery rain. Fog tending to lift.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 9 March, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 10 to on highest summits 15mph
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain; very little in total Bursts, probably brief, of showery rain now and again. Some places may well stay dry, and total rainfall everywhere small.
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive - although cloud base rising, perhaps breaking. Very likely blanket of fog from lower slopes up from dawn - though some breaks to some higher slopes. Cloud base will rise from late morning, and by afternoon, most cloud will be above 600 to 800m, and may substantially clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% rising to 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Widely dull and misty or murky morning. Patches of sunshine, perhaps extensive, will gradually come through, and visibility probably improving to be very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4C
Freezing Level	Above the summits

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South to on higher slopes southwesterly; increasingly through day from 20-30mph to 30 to 50mph (strongest Snowdon Notable wind chill and balance affected by the wind on exposed higher slopes - increasingly so, NW Wales late in day.	Westerly up to 45mph post dawn. Will drop to typically 30 or on higher tops Snowdon range 35mph by midday. Expect considerable wind chill and walking to be arduous particularly at first.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain until dusk Risk of an isolated brief burst of rain. Rain more widely after dark.	Hail and snow showers Occasional hail and above 750m snow showers.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Will come and go: may clear for a few hours before lowering afternoon Morning: cloud base widely rising to or above 750-900m, but may persist near Lleyn peninsula. Afternoon: Will deteriorate from west as cloud forms widely above 600 to 750m, but may well form below 300m Lleyn peninsula to Snowdon. 30%, but 70% for a few hours middle of day.	Extensively covering higher areas In precipitation, cloud temporarily forming below 400 to 600m (lowest morning westernmost slopes). Otherwise, by midday frequently between 750 and 1000m. 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun some lower slopes - though possibly more extensive east Wales and north of the Carneddau. Excellent visibility though a haze westernmost areas.	Bursts of sunshine, particularly afternoon. Visibility mostly very good or excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	3C - only slow drop in temperature higher up. Will feel as cold as minus 6C directly in the wind. Above the summits.	0C rising slowly toward 2C. Will feel like minus 10C directly in the wind. 900m slowly rising to just above highest summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 10 March, 2026**

Later this week - with the current mostly cloudy and hazy or murky conditions clearing on Tuesday night. Bouts of upland severe or storm force winds will reach the Scottish Highlands and gales periodically affecting other mountain areas. Freeze thaw cycles will occur on higher areas south from S Scotland whilst the Scottish Highlands experience infrequent thaw, with fresh snow sometimes reaching lower slopes, whilst extensive higher up.

Forecast issued at 15:30 on Sunday, 8 March, 2026
