

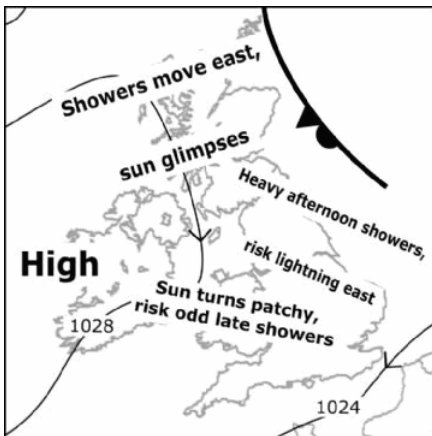
# Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

## General Summary for Monday, 27 April, 2026



### British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 27 April, 2026

Morning showers and fog Scottish Highlands, showers trending eastward, heavier afternoon. Dry morning England and Wales, little hill cloud, then heavy afternoon showers, frequent and locally torrential over the Pennines with a risk of lightning. Little wind, but gusty around afternoon showers, deteriorating into night.

Morning cloud lifts, some banks linger high north terrain

## Detailed Forecast for Monday, 27 April, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Northerly 5-15mph; a northeasterly trend into evening, sustained speeds rising towards 20mph into evening.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small most of the day, a nuisance breeze building on high terrain late in the day.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Likely dry</b> Small chance of a few light showers in south and eastern areas, but the hills likely stay dry.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Banks lingering on high northern slopes</b> Banks of cloud at various elevations from dawn, lifting to mostly above 700m, becoming well broken with summits breaks. Northern slopes and high tops of Snowdonia may continued to see banks come and go.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny, particularly low slopes; banks of cloud on high/northern slopes occasionally shroud the sun. Very good visibility, though an early haze.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	7 or 8C. May rise slightly towards mid-Wales.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.

	<b>Tuesday 28 April</b>	<b>Wednesday 29 April</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b> <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Northeasterly 20-25mph. Notable gusts, not just on high exposed terrain, approaching 40mph. <b>Walking impeded in exposure most of the day, at times more strenuous with buffeting gusts and wind chill.</b>	Easterly 35-45mph; powerful gusts over tops and downslope to the west, approaching 55mph to lower slopes. <b>Arduous walking with notable wind chill despite mild temperatures; strongest gusts necessitate significant effort for balance.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Scattered showers</b> Occasional showers, mostly light, and largely in east Wales. A few showers may drift further west.	<b>No rain expected</b>
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Variable banks over summits</b>  A layer of cloud above 600m early, most extensive eastern hills, this lifting through morning to just high terrain. Breaks off high summits are probable, but banks will return to summits at times too.	<b>None expected</b>  Some patchy mist in sheltered valleys of east Wales at dawn, this soon dissipating for cloud-free hills.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Rising to 70%</b>	<b>90%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sun, best chance of extended sun breaks west. Excellent visibility.	Widely sunny. Very good visibility.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b> <b>Freezing Level</b>	4 or 5C most slopes, but may rise towards 7C western slopes towards Llyn Peninsula. Above the summits.	7 or 8C. Feeling as cold as -5C in strongest wind.  Above the summits. Patchy frosts in sheltered valleys, mostly east Wales.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 28 April, 2026**

A core of high pressure lingers northeast of Scotland well into the week. The weather will be mostly sunny but also windy, particularly in Wales and the southern Pennines; challenging conditions are likely for several days on high Welsh mountains, powerful gusts over tops and downslope to the west requiring great effort to maintain stability. Despite Monday showers, dry ground conditions, warm temperatures, and wind bring a high risk of wildfire. More settled in Scotland, though breezy in the west, most hill cloud in the east.

Detail becomes uncertain into next weekend, but a rising risk of showers and longer spells of rain as pressure begins to drop.
