

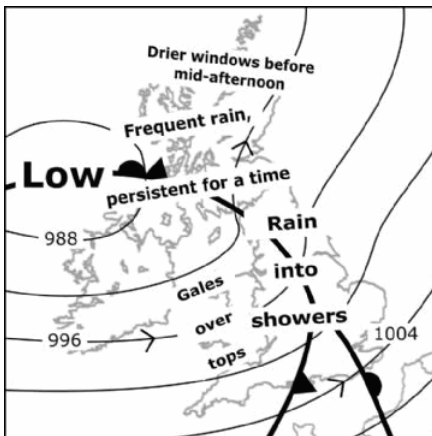
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

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General Summary for Wednesday, 3 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 3 June, 2026

A band of rain sweeps across the country bringing several hours of persistent rain and extensive fog: first in Wales, then England and much of Scotland by early afternoon. Breaking to frequent showers, risk isolated lightning. Very windy England and Wales, gales over Wales summits.

Rain soon sets in, afternoon showers; gales over tops

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 3 June, 2026

<p>How windy? (On the summits)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>Shifting southerly from southwesterly just before dawn, speeds already 30-40mph as day breaks, tops speeds reach 50mph over summits. Shifting southwesterly from midday, speeds at least 40mph for several afternoon hours, max speeds to 55-60mph.</p> <p>Walking soon arduous, and probably often challenging in exposure through afternoon. Balance will constantly be challenged with significant wind chill.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Heavy rain, drizzle, then showery</p> <p>Rain extends in from west early in day, soon fairly persistent, heavy for a time especially west, drizzly even when heavier rain fades. Showery bursts afternoon into evening, chance isolated thunder, some drier moments north and east.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free summits?</p>	<p>Extensive</p> <p>Blanket low cloud across the hills, from lower slopes up near the coast, rarely above 500-600m inland, highest bases toward northeast of Ogwen valley; some broader breaks here just around dawn. Base rising afternoon, high tops stay shrouded, ragged patches lower again in showers.</p> <p>10%</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Largely cloudy, dull, murky toward west in rain; hazy at best. Better visibility eastern hills below cloud, variably poor here too.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 900m)</p> <p>Freezing Level</p>	<p>6 or 7C at dawn, a slight rise as noon approaches but only to 8C. Wind chill feeling like -3 to -5C.</p> <p>Above the summits.</p>

	Thursday 4 June	Friday 5 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwest soon westerly, 30 to 40mph, speeds may vary, stronger gusts occasionally to 45mph. Strenuous walking conditions, frequent buffeting affecting balance on exposed high terrain. Marked wind chill.	Westerly 25-30mph just at dawn, soon easing towards 20-25mph, shifting southwesterly too, maybe 15mph later. Walking impeded in exposure with notable wind chill early, effects gradually easing, perhaps fairly small in places later.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Bursts of rain on and off, risk lightning Showery rain, some heavy bursts increasingly extend eastwards, small risk of thunder. Possibly a drier widow afternoon, some showers and drizzle near evening, but then easing into night.	Spotty rain, some drizzle Spots of light rain here and there, some drizzle in cloud on high tops; plenty of dry windows too, little precipitation towards Carneddau.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, varied Covering higher slopes frequently, more persistently in western areas, ragged patches to lower slopes during and after rain; tending to lift higher afternoon with some breaks east of high hill groups.	Mostly west, lifting to high terrain Fairly extensive above 600m in the west in the morning, bases towards 700-800m in the east; lifting through morning, breaking up somewhat, many hills clearing, though Wy Wyddfa may only see short breaks.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	Rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Rare brief sun, may break through in west for a time afternoon. Visibility occasionally good below cloud, but reduced in rain, at times poor.	A patchwork of sunshine. Good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6 or 7C, then tending to drop into night. Feeling near -5C directly in the wind. Above the summits.	3 or 4C at dawn, rising to 7C, little drop into night. Feeling like -5C in strongest early wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 4 June, 2026

An unsettled spell this week with low pressure over the north Atlantic and west-southwesterly winds dominating. Periods of rain mixed with showery days widely - the most constant rain over western mountains with low cloud often shrouding the hills; bases will typically lift somewhat afternoon. Wind speed will vary, but up to gale-force for periods over the hills this week. Temperatures near average, cooler at times. A brief brighter window Friday afternoon, then unsettled again over the weekend, though detail is currently uncertain. Next week is probably unsettled as well, at least in the north, but higher pressure south of the UK may bring drier and brighter periods to Wales and south Pennines. Scotland remains often blustery and wet, and perhaps chilly, risk briefly freezing on highest tops.
