

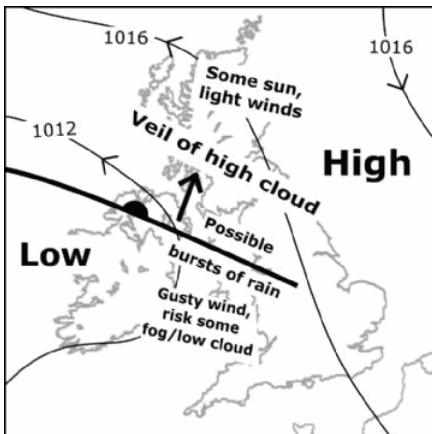

General Summary for Monday, 15 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 15 June, 2026

A largely dry day for the Highlands, light winds inland and north, some sun, but a layer of cloud increasingly covers the sky from the south, later some rain moving into coastal areas. A little rain for northern England and Wales, locally risk of a heavier burst of rain forming. Gusty southerly winds particularly Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Gusty wind. A little rain, an odd shower. Patchy cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 15 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southeasterly 20-25mph, notable gusts early in day, and tending to rise to sustained 30mph for a time afternoon, again rather gusty; switching west-southwesterly from dusk.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking becoming impeded on high terrain, some moments of strenuous walking during strongest gusts.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy rain, more often dry A band of rain passes northeast through morning, variable amounts, locally a burst of rain possible, some hills may stay substantially dry. Afternoon onward is mostly dry, just a few light patchy falls possible. Some drizzle later west.
Cloud on the hills?	Caps may cling to high summits Patchy banks of cloud early at various heights, mostly south/western slopes and many clear areas too. Bases lift to largely 900m and up, some breaks but caps around some tops. By evening, low cloud rolling in from southwest.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%, lowering into evening
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often cloudy, a few glimpses of weak sun from time to time, mainly north. Variable visibility, sometimes good but hazier if in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 to 12C, becoming quite humid. Feeling cooler in exposure to the gusty wind, nearer 3C on tops.
Freezing Level	Well above the summits.

	Tuesday 16 June	Wednesday 17 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 15-20mph from dawn, strengthening to 30mph afternoon, later nearer 40mph at least in gusts. Fairly small at dawn, deteriorating to strenuous conditions, stability challenged over tops with considerable wind chill.	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph, gusty around higher tops, some passes, also downslopes to the northeast. Blustery over the hills, strenuous walking in exposure on higher slopes, starting to affect balance on some ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, later setting in Patchy rain drifts from the southwest through morning, plenty of dry windows, but rain increasingly frequent afternoon, first towards mid-Wales, then more widely persistent across the west into evening.	Rain may persist, then fading A mix of rain, drizzle and some showery moments; the most frequent rain typically western hills, risk persistently wet over several hours. Tending to fade through afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, some early breaks High terrain shrouded from dawn, likely 500-600m upward; some morning periods of higher bases, any breaks to summits brief. Then more extensively shrouded afternoon from 400m up, higher bases north of the A5.	Extensive, some improvement afternoon Blanket cloud across the hills around rain, from lower slopes upward toward Cardigan Bay and Llyn Peninsula, here may persist over tops all day. Lifting to 600m near & northeast of the A5, some breaks form higher in afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly overcast, rare glimpses of weak sun early. Very good visibility below cloud, deteriorating later in rain.	Largely cloudy, some sun may break through afternoon mainly north/east. Hazy much of day near west coast, misty widely around rain, then visibility improves afternoon, to be very good well inland.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10 or 11C. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.	10C, little change all day. Feeling near to freezing directly in wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 16 June, 2026**

A variable southwesterly will dominate through mid to late this week - windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Pressure generally trending higher from the south by the weekend, though into Saturday at least a damp westerly likely prevails into western Scotland. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler in Scotland as low pressure to the northwest recycles air from the north Atlantic back onto the Munros. A window of drier and warmer weather is favoured into early the following week (22nd June), though a mixed Atlantic pattern may linger near to northwest Scotland in the longer range.
