

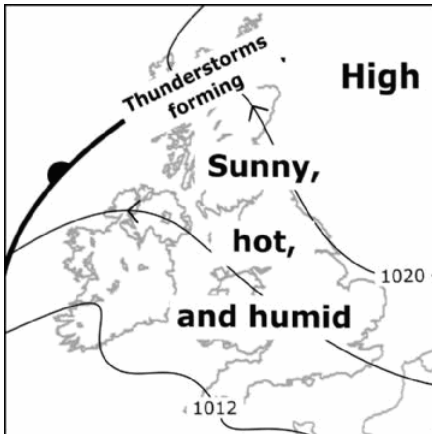

General Summary for Thursday, 25 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 June, 2026

An even hotter day across the mountains; sunny and humid - risk of sunburn and dehydration. Rain soon arrives into Northwest Highlands, thunderstorms afternoon, later stretching east and south. Moderate breezes, lightest early, strengthening into evening, walking becoming strenuous over high tops.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Hot, humid sunshine; wind strengthens, notably later

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 25 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southeasterly between 15 and 25mph; perhaps gusty at times with stronger sustained speeds later, up to 30-35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, although there may be sudden buffeting at times both on higher areas and some lower slopes, and deteriorating into nighttime.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Likely dry Remote risk of heavy showers/thunderstorms developing later afternoon giving locally torrential rain. This risk rises after dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Likely none though patches may form if rain occurs A few well-scattered patches of ragged fog at dawn, soon dissipating after sunrise for cloud-free hills. A low chance of some patchy cloud reforming on high terrain later if thunderstorms occur.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Nearly certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny, some patchy higher cloud around. Good visibility but a haze, which may thicken later from the south.
How Cold? (at 900m)	22C rising to an exceptionally warm 25 to 27C in afternoon, very humid too. Valley temperatures locally approaching 30 to 33C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Friday 26 June	Saturday 27 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South-southwesterly 20-25mph, strong gusts around showers, and risk rising later, gusty 30-35mph over tops. Affecting ease of walking in exposure most of the day, may deteriorate to strenuous conditions on tops with buffeting.	Southerly, some uncertainty of peak speed, in range 30mph to possibly 50mph, at least in gusts around Snowdon group. Expect strenuous walking conditions, more challenging in places with buffeting gusts knocking you off balance.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Bursts of rain/thunderstorms, mostly early From before dawn, risk scattered bursts of heavy rain or thunderstorms. Risk tends to ease through afternoon, though east Wales may continue to see rain for a time.	Bursts of rain, risk thunder High uncertainty of detail, but expect clusters of heavy showery rain tracking northeastward throughout the day. Lengthy drier windows possible, but risk sudden downpours, thunder and lightning.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Patchy banks forming Mountains may start substantially clear, just odd ragged patches here and there. With time, banks increasingly forming from 500m up at varied heights (summits may be out of cloud at times). Mostly affecting slopes toward Cardigan Bay; Carneddau/east Wales may remain clear. 50%	Varied, mostly west and in rain Varied cloud banks, most frequent over west coastal slopes. Some patches lower down inland in morning. Breaks to tops more often north and east. In rain, banks lower and fill in, ragged low patches. 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sunshine, more extensive sun north and east later. Visibility improves after morning haze lifts.	Glimpses of sun, but high cloud covering sky for periods. Some mistiness in morning. Visibility often good, but occasionally poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	Starting near an exceptionally hot and humid 22 to 24C, cooling to 15 to 17C, coolest towards Cardigan Bay. Above the summits.	Around 14C, small variation all day. Still rather humid. Feeling cooler directly in wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 26 June, 2026

Exceptionally warm and humid most mountain areas until later Friday; valley temperatures approaching the low-to-middle 30s in England and Wales, with hill temperatures approaching the mid-to-high 20s. Scotland will be slightly cooler, though temperatures will still reach the low 20s on many slopes.

A risk of extended torrential thunderstorms on Friday afternoon in northern areas. Thunderstorms may continue in the north on Saturday as well, but progressively less warm as the weekend goes: fronts begin to come in off the Atlantic, bringing a strengthening wind and bands of rain and low cloud, particularly affecting western mountains. Into next week, Atlantic westerlies will dominate with mixed weather.
