

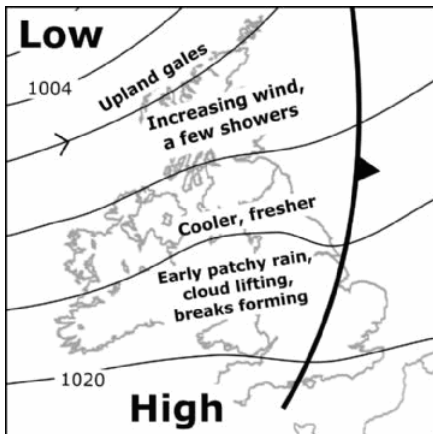

General Summary for Sunday, 28 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 June, 2026

Strengthening southwesterly winds, reaching gale force over western Scottish mountains, soonest near Skye. Much fresher everywhere, rather chilly on tops in exposure to wind. Some early rain, improving as cloud lifts and breaks, but scattered showers move east across the Highlands into the afternoon.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Breezy. Early patchy rain, cloud lifts to tops, breaks form.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 28 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly 20-25mph, sometimes gusting 30mph over tops, briefly stronger 35mph around dawn; later in day again more sustained 30mph and trending westerly.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small for periods, but breezy and feeling fresh, gusts at times impact ease of walking, more consistently impeded at dawn and again later in the day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early showery rain, then substantially dry From before dawn, several bands of rain pass west-to-east, brief heavier falls at first, soon clearing during morning to become largely dry, odd light spots of rain drifting onto western hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting and breaking through morning Fairly extensive early morning, to most middle slopes, or lower western slopes with ragged lower patches at first. During morning, a rising and breaking trend, to banks above 800m with increasing breaks by afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% at first, rising middle of day to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy start breaking into a patchwork of cloud and sun Visibility becoming very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 or 11C, cooling later afternoon to 9C. Feeling like 3C directly in breeze on tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly trending southwesterly 10-15mph, stronger early, sustained 20mph around dawn. Mostly small, some breezy moments early in exposure.	Southerly 20 to 25mph, at times 30mph higher western tops; shifting southwest later westerly, speeds varying. Feeling blustery and cool over higher mountains. In places gusts may affect balance on exposed ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, afternoon showers, drier east Light patchy rain drifts onto west slopes from dawn, mostly light with dry windows, more frequent on higher west aspects. Some risk of showery bursts forming afternoon. Very little rain reaches east hills.	Frequent or persistent rain, some heavy Areas of rain and showers throughout the day, periods of constant rain, some heavy bursts tending to drift eastwards, risk of isolated thunder. May tend to clear from west coast later in day.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lifting to high terrain with breaks Banks of cloud at multiple elevations at dawn, most extensive west aspects where banks may reach lower slopes. Lifting through morning, to largely just banks over tops afternoon, and breaks probable; briefly lower again if showers occur. 40% rising to 70%	Fairly extensive Shrouding most high terrain all day, varying bases around rain, some ragged patches to lower slopes. Local breaks may form higher up Carneddau to Bala groups. 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sunshine, some variable thin high cloud around. Very good visibility.	Generally cloudy, a little weak sun mainly morning in east, then late in day west. Visibility often reduced by rain, poor for periods; intermittently very good if dry.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9C rising to 12C. Above the summits.	9 or 10C, little variation all day. Feeling like 0C directly in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 29 June, 2026

A westerly Atlantic pattern dominates the new week: high pressure south and low pressure north will bring alternating periods of rain punctuated by bright sunshine. Wind generally on the strong side with mild to sometimes warm temperatures, though cooler and windier spells at times produce significant wind chill on Scottish tops. Western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and patchy rain, while east and southern areas likely drier and sunnier. This pattern is likely to continue into next weekend.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Saturday, 27 June, 2026
