

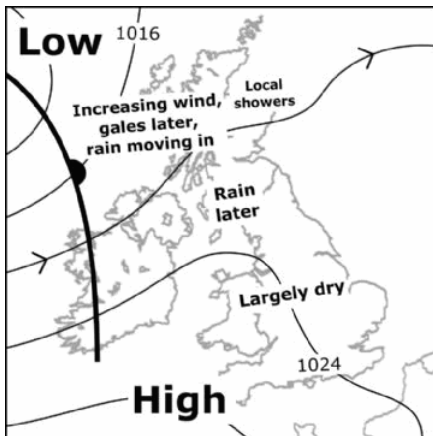
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Wednesday, 1 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 July, 2026

Rapidly strengthening wind into the afternoon, gales develop increasingly widely later. Odd showers, then rain sweeps into western Scotland through the afternoon, setting in. England & Wales largely dry until evening. Cloud fairly widely on western hills in the morning, lifting for a time prior to rain.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Varied cloud, wind increasing, gales and rain late in day.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 1 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 20mph in morning, briefly less, then strengthening southwesterly, to 30-35mph afternoon, during evening toward 50mph, gusts 60mph high tops, turning westerly again 50-60mph into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small in the morning, but becoming more blustery, walking uncomfortable then arduous later in exposure, with considerable wind chill by evening. Ongoing very difficult conditions overnight.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly dry until late, rain toward dusk Generally dry in morning, an odd light shower in north. Late in day, some spots of rain develop from northwest, amounting to very little until dusk, then an hour or so of steadier rain, breaking to showers into night.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lifting until late, some breaks Covering many hills in the morning, to some mid-slopes in west. Tending to lift and break toward upper slopes, clearing best inland and toward east by middle of day into afternoon. Lowering and filling in western hills up to dusk.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 60%; by dusk 20% west
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, some sun breaks through, then giving way to thickening high cloud from west. Visibility very good below/out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 or 9C, little variation all day. Feeling near or later below freezing on high tops as wind increases.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Thursday 2 July	Friday 3 July
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly, 50-60mph dawn-early morning, lessening to 30mph during morning, 20-30mph in afternoon. Severe conditions from overnight and still difficult well into daytime, walking and balance challenging, slowly improving.	Southwesterly 20 to 30mph, speeds likely to fluctuate during the day, may increase to 40mph at least in gusts. Blustery over the hills, affecting comfortable walking on exposed higher areas, some buffeting gusts on ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers fade Overnight rain likely clears to leave showery conditions in the morning, becoming well scattered and brief afternoon, more often dry.	A little rain west Patchy drizzle, most common western hills, may develop into some steadier rain at times, but likely small amounts; little if any reaching eastern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting toward or above tops Covering high terrain fairly widely from dawn, lifting toward highest tops and gradually tending to thin and break, but patches may come and go western tops.	Varied cloud mostly western tops Patchy cloud banks mostly over western hills, a chance of filling in for periods on tops, but sometimes breaking up. More often clearer well inland and eastern hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% rising to 60%	40% west, 70% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun breaking through, most often eastern lower slopes. Visibility good below cloud, some haze toward coastal areas.	A mix of sun and high cloud, but may cloud over more in west. Visibility good out of cloud inland, some haze toward coast.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9 or 10C, little variation all day. Directly in the stronger winds feeling like -5C on tops, nearer 0C later. Above the summits.	10 or 11C, little variation all day. Feeling nearer to 0C directly in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 2 July, 2026**

West to southwesterlies prevail across northern Britain. Rain, drizzle and low cloud most frequent over western hills from Lake District northward. Temperatures near average, but feeling cool in exposure to wind on tops. An improving trend from the south over the weekend as higher pressure builds, best conditions for Wales and eastern hills elsewhere. Drier and warmer conditions more likely into next week, very warm some days England and Wales, though southwesterlies still bring more cloud to western Scotland, some rain at times, wettest toward northwest.
