

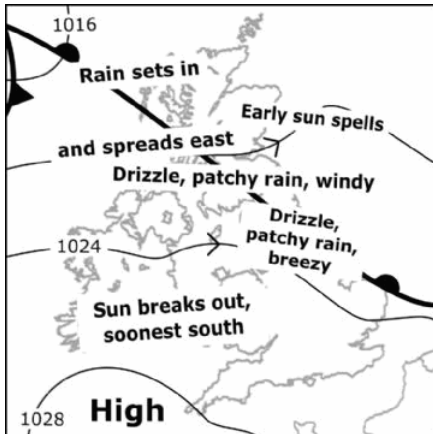
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Includes all summits in the the northern half of Wales from Pumlumon northwards.



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General Summary for Sunday, 5 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 5 July, 2026

Early sunny bursts in east Scotland, rain and cloud setting in west and spreading widely with time. Extensive cloud and drizzle on English summits, some patchy rain, notably northwest hill groups; south Pennines drier later. Largely dry Wales, sun increasingly breaking out (through high cloud), particularly south.

Early cloud patches breaking to warm sun

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 5 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15-25mph; some variability, gusty over high tops and passes, and generally higher end of the range early and late in the day when gusts approach 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Locally fairly small, but ease of walking becoming impacted on high exposed terrain, occasional buffeting gusts.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Some fine drizzle in the air over high terrain where in cloud, chance of a few early patches of light rain from the west in the early morning, this all fading for a dry afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to upper slopes, well-broken Fairly extensive high terrain with banks to at least middle slopes in the morning, patches to lower western slopes. Lifting trend with time to largely 800m and above, some breaks forming too, particularly later. With time, summits may be near the top of any cloud.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Increasingly sunny, particularly lower slopes, but weakened by high cloud; sun extensive to the south and east by later afternoon. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11 or 12C, little or no change with added height. May locally rise a degree east Wales.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 15-25mph, some variability and gusty over tops; a slight easing trend with time. Locally fairly small, but ease of walking becoming impacted on high exposed terrain, some buffeting gusts.	West-northwesterly 15-25mph, strongest wind early and quite gusty (not just high terrain); northwesterly trend. Ease of walking affected in the morning, some buffeting gusts affecting stability, sometimes fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little rain expected Some fine drizzle in the air over high terrain where in cloud in the early hours, a small risk of a few spots of light rain, but soon entirely dry.	Likely dry Small chance of some light drizzly rain drifting along northernmost slopes, but likely entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lifting to upper slopes, tops sometimes exposed Fairly extensive upper terrain with banks to at least middle slopes, patches to lower west slopes; high summits near the top of the cloud layer. Lifting trend with time to largely 800m and above, breaks increasingly forming. 30% rising to 60%	Lifting and mostly breaking A fairly extensive bank on upper slopes in the morning; highest tops may be at or above the cloud later. A lifting trend and much cloud breaking up, though banks will cling to high western slopes for periods. 70% (summits perhaps above cloud early)
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Increasingly sunny on lower slopes but weakened by high cloud. Very good visibility.	Sun increasingly breaking out widely; high tops may be in sun above cloud most of the day. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	11C rising to 13 to 15C, warmest east of high terrain. Above the summits.	11 or 12C, rising to 14C, or slightly higher towards mid-Wales; little or no change with added height. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 6 July, 2026

Rain, drizzle and low cloud persist over western hills from Lake District northward into early next week. Temperatures near average, but feeling cool in exposure to wind on tops, quite strong and gusty central and south Scotland. Northeast areas are drier with higher cloud bases but rain reaches here too. Higher pressure south maintains drier conditions in Wales and the south Pennines but cloud and some drizzle will affect high western slopes from time to time; lighter wind here, but nuisance gusts in exposure. A drier and warmer window builds into the middle of next week: very warm in England and Wales, spells of sunshine spread northward, and lighter wind. Some showers and patchy rain continue through late week and next weekend, though detail is uncertain and more often dry.
