

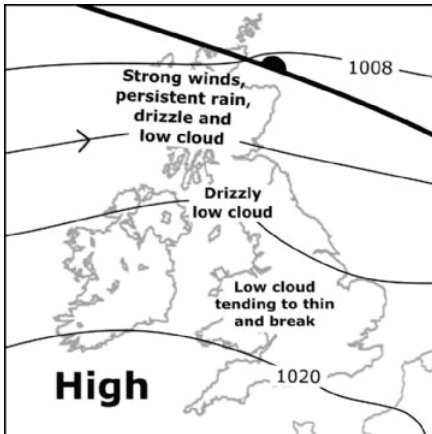

General Summary for Monday, 6 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 6 July, 2026

Windy and generally wet across Scottish hills, rain and drizzle most persistent in northwestern Highlands. Breezy, damp and drizzly too for northern England. Drier and lighter winds for Wales. Poor visibility with low cloud cloaking many hills through the day, best of any breaks toward east.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Breezy, gusty in places. Low cloud on hills, some improvement.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 6 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25mph, some variability and gusty 30mph in places over tops; a slight easing trend with time 20-25mph, but speeds rise a little into evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Locally fairly small, but ease of walking becoming impacted on high exposed terrain, some buffeting gusts.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little rain expected Some fine drizzle in the air over high terrain where in cloud in the early hours, a small risk of a few spots of light rain, but soon entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to upper slopes, tops sometimes exposed Fairly extensive upper terrain with banks to at least middle slopes, patches to lower west slopes; high summits near the top of the cloud layer. Lifting trend with time to largely 800m and above, breaks increasingly forming.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Increasingly sunny on lower slopes by mid-late morning, but weakened by thin high cloud. Misty start in west, improving to very good visibility out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11C rising to 13 to 15C, warmest east of high terrain.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Tuesday 7 July	Wednesday 8 July
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West-northwesterly 15-25mph, strongest wind early and quite gusty (not just high terrain); northwesterly trend. Ease of walking affected in the morning, some buffeting gusts affecting stability, sometimes fairly small.	Southwesterly 15 to 20mph. Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Likely dry Small chance of some light drizzly rain drifting along northernmost slopes, but likely entirely dry.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lifting and mostly breaking A fairly extensive bank on upper slopes in the morning; highest tops may be at or above the cloud later. A lifting trend and much cloud breaking up, though banks will cling to high western slopes for periods. 70% (summits perhaps above cloud early)	Very little, some west coast fog Some cloud banks on hill slopes mainly western areas in the morning, higher terrain more likely clear. All dispersing, but possible low-level coastal fog near Llyn Peninsula for periods. 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun increasingly breaking out widely; high tops may be in sun above cloud most of the day. Very good visibility.	Sunshine and thin fair-weather cloud. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	11 or 12C, rising to 14C, or slightly higher towards mid-Wales; little or no change with added height. Above the summits.	14C rising to 17C afternoon. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 7 July, 2026**

A damp start westerly pattern continues at the start of the week, particularly in Scotland, then a drier and warmer window builds into the middle of the week: very warm in England and Wales, spells of sunshine spread northward, and lighter wind. Some patchy rain continues through late week in western Scotland though detail is uncertain and more often dry. High pressure is indicated to expand across Scotland through next weekend bringing more widely dry and warm conditions in the extended outlook into mid July - easterly winds likely develop, particularly England and Wales; a chance of some thunderstorms.
